

The San Francisco Fire Department

SUPPRESSION fights fires, provides Emergency Medical Services (EMS), oversees specialized services such as Hazardous Materials units and Search and Rescue units, and conducts disaster planning and preparedness training

PREVENTION minimizes injuries, deaths and property loss due to fire through code enforcement, public education and inspection programs that detect and eliminate fire hazards

HOMELAND SECURITY maintains liaison with State and Federal intelligence agencies, prepares Emergency Response plans, designs and implements large-scale disaster drills and applies for, secures and manages Federal Grant Funding for purchase of disaster and emergency equipment

INVESTIGATION determines, documents and reports on the origin and cause of fires and explosions, ensuring that such incidents can be prosecuted, if appropriate

SUPPORT SERVICES manages the SFFD's facilities, equipment and vehicle fleet, and is responsible for all maintenance, repairs and capital improvements. Support Services also oversees the Department's Ladder Manufacturing Shop and the Brass Shop, where nozzles, fittings and High Pressure Reducing Valves are created

TRAINING & EDUCATION instructs and evaluates all SFFD staff and new recruits and provides comprehensive Fire and EMS training to all Department personnel

FIREBOAT operates and maintains the City's Fireboats and is responsible for Water Rescue and Fire Suppression on the San Francisco Bay

AIRPORT provides fire suppression, EMS and emergency preparedness services at the San Francisco International Airport

ADMINISTRATION supports operational activities by maintaining programs such as Accounting and Finance, Planning and Research, Human Resources, Payroll, Public Information, The Department Physician's Office and Management Information Services
