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# San Francisco Fire Department Conducts Disaster Response Drill with NERT Volunteers on Sunday April 17<sup>th</sup> 2016

## WHAT:

The SFFD will activate response to a catastrophic event in this simulation drill. NERT members from all over San Francisco will convene at Marina Middle School to put their training into action in this all-day drill. NERT volunteers will practice search and rescue techniques, triaging injured victims, setting up neighborhood command centers, and other essential disaster response skills. Over 200 volunteers have signed up to participate in this April Drill. NERT was first delivered 25 years ago in October and we are just warming up our yearlong celebration.

Additionally, the SFFD, in conjunction with the NERT Drill, will demonstrate the capabilities of our Urban Search and Rescue teams, including our Canines during a live exercise in the morning and afternoon. Additionally, the SFFD's Portable Water and Hydrant System will be displayed.

The NERT drill is a registered event in PrepareAthon!, a community-based campaign to build a more secure and resilient nation by getting people to understand what disasters could happen in their communities and to take action to increase their preparedness. #### **NERT uses Twitter to Save Lives**

After two recent pilot classes, NERTs learned how to gather and use key information shared on Twitter during an emergency. Those photos, video, posts and tweets about the incident or emergency scene will allow first responders, including NERTs, to be better prepared for a possible Search & Rescue mission. NERT will use Twitter during the drill to practice how to:

- 1. Quickly report and verify the most critical issues
- 2. Deploy fire, water, and police resources more strategically
- 3. Get and report information online to decrease the number of 911 calls, freeing the system up for the most critical issues

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#### About NERT

The San Francisco Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) is a disaster preparedness organization sponsored by the San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD). The program offers free, basic and advanced preparedness training to those who live and work in San Francisco, and provides an organizing framework for neighborhood teams in the city.

Teams gather after a disaster to survey their neighborhoods, provide information to the SFFD, conduct light search and rescue and medical triage, and help transport victims to medical treatment facilities. Since the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, NERT has trained over 25,700 civilians to assist the San Francisco Fire Department after a major disaster by taking care of themselves, their families, and their neighbors. NERT has held annual Citywide drills since 1992.
