## OPERATIONS REPORT

October 1 – October 31, 2022

### GREATER ALARMS:

There was one Greater Alarm fires during this reporting period.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Alarm** – (10/9/22) 1831 hours, 1926 Palou Avenue, cross streets Quint and Rankin streets. There were no injuries. The cause of this fire is under investigation. (Acting Assistant Chief Dustin Winn)

### **Discovery of Fire**

E42 was the first company to arrive on scene and gave an initial report of a working fire in a 2-story, type 5 residential fire. The officer gave the initial report on A10 because A3 had additional radio traffic and dispatches. Heavy fire and smoke were apparent from the Charlie sides of 1926 and 1930 Palou Street. E42 decided to deploy the 150' ready line through the garage level of 1926 Palou. This was the location of the seat of the fire. E42 Officer conveyed to Engine 9 Officer, the second due, that there was heavy fire on the Charlie side of the building and that he should take the 200' ready line through the Delta Exposure to assist in attacking the fire and keeping it from getting into Delta exposure. E09's driver retreated to E42, dropping both 3" Large Diameter Hose Lines to the Engine 42 driver. Engine 9 proceeded to the intersection of Palou and Silver, the initial location of the box. Engine 9 proceeded to search for a low-pressure hydrant, located on the dead-end location of Quint, a street previously accessible from Palou, but since closed off. Thus, Engine 9 had difficulty spotting the hydrant. Engine Company 17, the third due, arrived at Palou and Silver. The E17 Officer instructed their driver to assist the Engine 9 driver who was hand jacking multiple lengths of hose to secure the LPH on Quint. E17 took the remainder of their crew to the top floor of the fire building, leading a LDH with a wye with a bundle where they encountered heavy fire conditions in the hallway, kitchen, interior stairway and two back bedrooms. T17 was the first truck company to arrive on scene. The company officer directed his crew to raise the 35' ladder to the delta 2 exposure and split his crew, 3 to the roof and 2 interiors of the fire building. A hole was cut in the roof of the FB and the interior crew assisted with overhaul and search of the fire floors. T09 was the second truck company to arrive on scene. The company officer directed his crew to raise the 35' ladder to the bravo 2 exposure and split his crew, 3 to the roof of the bravo building and 2 interiors of the fire building to assist with search, overhaul and putting a hole in the bravo roof. B10 arrived on scene and placed Palou Street Command in Service and switched all channels to C10 direct. The Battalion 10 Chief supervised 3 engine companies and 2 truck companies within 2 buildings that were heavily involved with fire. Rescue Company 2 arrived and was able to conduct a primary and secondary search of the fire building and eventually the Bravo exposure building. Engine Company 25 arrived on scene as the RIC Company and set up the RIC firefighting equipment next to the command post. At this point, Division 3 and took command of the incident. Both buildings were still showing heavy fire and smoke showing from the Charlie sides of

the buildings. B10 briefed Division 3 of the locations of all the companies. Division 3 then announced over the tactical channel that B10 would be assigned as fire attack. Division 3 requested a 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm over A3 and repeated this announcement over the TAC C10. Battalion 6 then arrived on scene. Division 3 instructed B6 to the Bravo exposure and named them Bravo. B6 reported to Command that there was heavy fire in the Bravo exposure on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> floors. Division 3 assigned E25 to the Bravo exposure and to lead a 3" LDH wyed off to bundles. The leads were made to the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> floors.

### **Second Alarm Companies**

E37 was the first company to arrive and was immediately tasked with supplying E42 from the high address side of the block. The rest of the E37 company was instructed to take a LDH up the 35' Delta 2 to assist Truck 17 with possible fire impingement of the Delta exposure as well as roofing materials of the fire building. E37 was also instructed to extinguish the palm tree in the backyard of Delta 2 that had ignited and was dropping embers. E32 was the next engine company to arrive with their whole company intact. They were assigned to the command post as the replacement RIC company. They remained at the command post for the duration of the fire. Engine company 44 was next due and was assigned to work for FA in the fire building. They were initially ordered by FA to replace E42 on the lower floor so E42 could switch out their bottles. E44 was later reassigned to Bravo and assisted with overhaul and checking for fire extension. Battalion 3 arrived and was initially assigned to check the Charlie sides of the buildings. B3 was able to give feedback and then was assigned as Safety and placed on the roof of the Bravo exposure. T11 checked into the command post and was immediately assigned to Bravo working for B6. They assisted in opening ceilings and walls on both floors. E11 was the last company to arrive and was assigned to check for possible extension in Bravo 2. None was found. Heavy fire and smoke conditions were still present in both the Fire Building and the Bravo exposure during the arrival of all second alarm companies.

### **Delay in Response**

There was no delay in response to the first of second alarms that was struck. All companies arrived swiftly and operated quickly to extinguish the fire.

### **Delay in Reporting**

There was one delay in operations/reporting. Due to the closure of Quint Street, at Palou, a delay in continuous water supply occurred. A few years ago, a barrier was put up on Quint Street, not allowing the flow of traffic to continue when traveling in the North/South direction on that street. The nearest hydrant that ended up being utilized was on this newly formed dead-end street on Quint. If this closure of the street had not occurred, Engine 9 would have easily been able to drive up to the hydrant, spot the rig and go through the process of supplying the first due, Engine 42. Instead, Engine 9 did not initially see the hydrant due to being blocked by cars, vertical posts, and shrubbery. Fortunately, Engine 17 saw that hydrant on approach to the incident and the officer instructed the Engine 17 driver to assist the Engine 9 driver in securing a supply. Engine 9 gave their tank quickly to E42 and had to hand jack the hose line at least 2 lengths to the hydrant. During that time, Engine 9 briefly lost their tank and prime, but quickly regained control. Once E17 finished securing the initial supply, the officer instructed them to circle the block and secure secondary redundant supply to E42 from the high address side of Palou, but this did not occur.

### **Condition of Building After Fire**

Heavy fire damage was present in both the Fire Building and the Bravo exposure. Red Cross was notified to assist with housing for the 15 occupants.

**Describe Strategy**

Upon arrival, Division 3 wanted to ensure that companies on scene were fighting fire aggressively, safely, and professionally. Division 3 insured that hose leads were placed on all floors of the fire building, and the Bravo exposure, to the lower floor of the delta exposure and to the roofs of both exposures. Continuous monitoring of fire conditions was relayed from Fire Attack, Bravo and Safety to Command. Ventilation holes were made in both the Fire Building and the Bravo exposure to relieve both buildings of flames/fire, superheated gasses, and smoke. Tracking of companies was a top priority.

**Operations that Worked Well**

The crews worked aggressively and professionally. Despite the extensive fire was present on multiple floors and buildings, the crews quickly extinguished them and eliminated additional exposures. It is important to note that upon arrival, heavy fire was already present in 2 buildings and both the Delta and Bravo 2 were threatened.

- Presented opening remarks at the Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) courses to discuss the Division of Training's progress and projects and answer questions.
- Attended the CD1 monthly staff meeting to brief out on the Division of Training.
- Represented Chief Nicholson at the Los Angeles FIRESCOPE Board of Directors meeting with fire service leaders across California to discuss emerging programs, fire/rescue regional policies, and cooperative agreements.
- Attended the Fire Work Group meeting to discuss regional training needs and advocate for training within the City and County of San Francisco. SFFD is a stakeholder within the Bay Area Training and Exercise Program (BATEP).
- Participated in the regular Fire Commission Meetings, the Career Firefighter Health Study, Loma Prieta Commemoration, and the Meritorious Awards Ceremony.
- Conducted the Career Development Workgroup. As Co-Chair of, reviewed previous committee work, identified gaps, and discussed the integration of current work and steps to complete a draft for CD1 review.
