## OPERATIONS REPORT

March 1 – March 31, 2023

### GREATER ALARMS:

There were four Greater Alarm fires during this reporting period.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Alarm** – (3/3/23) 1618 hours, 2143 Pine Street, cross streets Buchanan and Webster streets. There were no injuries. The cause of this fire was accidental. (Acting Assistant Chief Richard Untalan)

On March 3, 2023, a Fire in the Building was dispatched for 2143 Pine Street. RP reported flames coming from the roof, and that everyone is out of the building of 2143 Pine Street. The initial units dispatched were E38, E05, E03, T05, T10, B04, B02, D2, RS1 and M90.

Due to the time of day arriving companies experienced heavy traffic on Pine St, which caused delays in personnel and apparatus placement. SFPD was requested for traffic control.

Upon arrival Engine 38 reported light smoke from the Alpha/Delta roof line with workers on roof and declared a working fire. There was roof work on the Delta exposure, but no roof access. Engine 38 determined there was no roof access from the Delta exposure and gained access to the roof via Truck 5's aerial ladder. Truck 5's ladder was placed on the Delta exposure and led a line to the Delta exposure roof. Battalion 4, Chief Gering arrived on scene declared 2143 Pine Street as the Fire building and began fire extinguishment on the top floor (4<sup>th</sup> floor) and requested a Truck company with ceiling hooks and an attic extension. All members of Truck 5 were directed by Battalion 4 Chief Gering to conduct roof operations. Truck 5 was directed to cut a hole in the Alpha/Delta corner of the fire building and then requested a line to the roof as heavy winds caused the fire from the hole cut to spread onto the roof. Engine 5 supplied Engine 38 and was ordered to stretch a large line wye to the top floor of 2143 Pine St. and deployed a 100' hose bundle on the floor.

When T/Division 2 Chief Untalan arrived and assumed Command, Battalion 4 Chief Gering was assigned Fire Attack and Battalion 2 Chief Schwartz was assigned Safety. They gained access to the two bottom units, checked for extension, conducted a primary search, and requested the garage be opened. Battalion 2, Chief Schwartz rescued a large dog in the lower unit and returned it to its owner. Then, they assisted on the fire floor with extinguishment and salvage. A request was given to dispatch SFPD for traffic control and PGE for gas and electricity.

As the first alarm companies arrived at the Command Post, Engine 3 was directed to lead a line from the existing large line wye on the top floor and assist with fire attack. Truck 10's apparatus was parked at the end of the block due to heavy traffic and approached the fire scene with a 35' ladder. Then, they were directed to bring ceilings hooks and an attic extension and report to Fire Attack on the top floor. Rescue 1 was directed to conduct a primary and secondary search of the fire building. Primary and Secondary searches by Rescue 1 of the fire building were negative. Engine 10 was assigned to the RIC team and crew and equipment staged at the Command Post.

As all first alarm companies were given assignments, a 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm was struck to assist with exposure protection and fire attack. As 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm companies arrived at the Command Post, orders were given to assist with fire attack and to check for extension in the Bravo and Delta exposures. Engine 36 was directed to advance a large line to the top floor and assist with fire attack. Engine 41 led a supply line to Engine 3 and was directed to check for extension on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the fire building. Engine 41 then assisted companies on the top floor with overhaul and salvage. Engine 21 was directed to secure the garage door in an open position and to lead a line to the Bravo exposure check for extension and conduct a primary search. There was no fire in the Bravo exposure, but a tenant and dog were escorted out of the building.

Engine 16 was directed to drive Truck 10's apparatus and place the aerial to the Bravo exposure and lead a large line wye from Engine 3 up the aerial and to check for fire extension. Truck 16 deployed their aerial to the Delta 2 exposure (Webster Street) and was directed to bring ceiling hooks and an attic extension and assist with fire attack on the 4<sup>th</sup> floor. Battalion 3, Chief Miller was assigned to check the Delta exposure to check for fire extension. They found no fire in the Delta exposure and were directed to assist Rescue 1 who was involved in a minor accident upon arrival.

4710 arrived on scene to determine the cause and origin of the fire. PG&E arrived on scene and shut down electricity and gas to the fire building. Once the incident was under control, Command was transferred to Battalion 4, Chief Gering.

The owner was advised to contact their insurance company to arrange for an emergency restoration company to secure the building from the elements and for possible theft. The owner declined assistance from the Red Cross.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Alarm** – (3/5/23) 0857 hours, 626 40<sup>th</sup> Avenue, cross streets Anza and Balboa streets. The cause of this fire was accidental. (Assistant Chief William Storti)

While cooking, an oil fire started on the stove spreading to the rest of the kitchen and up the kitchen lightwell to the kitchen in the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor flat. Dispatch was called to 626 40<sup>th</sup> Ave at 08:58 hours. Engine 34 arrived on-scene at 09:00 hours and declared a working fire. B07 arrived on-scene at 09:03 hours and requested a 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm. The building owner met the companies outside and stated he was the only occupant, and everyone was out. The flat on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor was vacant. E34 reported a 3-story, type 5 building with heavy fire from the Alpha side windows from the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floor flats. E34 led a 150' ready-line to the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, while E14 lead a 200' ready-line to back up E14. E23 took a large-line wye to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor, and E31 took a large line wye to the Bravo exposure. T14 cut a hole over the fire, while T18 went to the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors to assist. RS1 completed primary and secondary searches. Second alarm companies assisted with overhaul.

The fire traveled up the lightwell between the fire building and bravo exposure. There was moderate damage to the Bravo exposure during overhaul. B07 established command and assigned B08 as fire attack. B08 checked the garage then proceeded to the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. D2 relieved B07 of command and assigned her to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. B05 was assigned safety. Hose leads were done quickly and effectively.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Alarm** – (3/17/23) 0252 hours, 959 Powell Street, cross streets Clay and Freeman streets. The cause of this fire is under investigation. (Assistant Chief Ken Yee)

On the morning of March 17, 2023, at approximately 03:00 in the morning, a full box for a Fire in the Building was struck for 959 Powell Street, a four story, 12-unit apartment building. Companies dispatched were Engine 2, Engine 41, Engine 13, Truck 2, Truck 13, Rescue Squad 1, Battalion 1, Division 2 and Medic 52.

Responding down the hill on Clay Street, Engine 41, Lieutenant Escobar saw smoke and flames coming from the roof of 959 Powell and declared a Working Fire. Engine 41 turned onto Powell Street and parked just past the fire building, where the crew pulled a ready line to attack the fire on the third floor. Engine 2, led by Captain Rivieccio, arrived next and brought a large line wye to the second floor and extended this line with a small line bundle.

Captain Mike Thompson, arriving on Truck 2, saw the fire had already been auto exposed to the fourth floor and raised their aerial to the roof, sending the entire crew to the roof for roof operations. While their aerial was being placed, a couple of firefighters from Truck 2 laddered the fire escape in front of the building. Once on the roof, the crew from Truck 2 cut a 4' x 4' hole on the roof for ventilation and to prevent the fire from extending across the attic and possibly burning through the entire building. Members from Truck 2 also removed the skylight above the interior stairs, providing some much-needed relief for the firefighters leading hose lines and conducting search and rescue operations inside the fire building.

Battalion 1, Chief Griffin set up Powell Street Command as Captain Molloy from Truck 13 checked in for an assignment.

As Division 2 was approaching the scene on Powell Street, it was apparent that the fire had reached multiple apartments on at least two floors, and the fire was starting to get into the attic space, and Assistant Chief Yee struck a second alarm. While Command was being transferred, an elderly woman was spotted climbing out onto the fourth-floor fire escape and Captain Molloy and Firefighters Lucas and Rivera from Truck 13 were tasked with rescuing this woman off the fire escape and checking her for injuries.

The fire had started on the third floor, blowing out into the light well on the Bravo, or left, side of the building, and auto-exposing into two of the fourth-floor apartments. Rescue Squad 1 Firefighters Estupinian and Kauf rescued a second victim in the rear apartment on the fourth floor and brought her down to be evaluated by the Medics. The fire and smoke had trapped this woman in her unit above the fire and she was unable to find an exit until these members from Rescue Squad 1 found her and brought her outside.

With the arrival of the second alarm units, additional hose leads were put in place to contain the fire to the units already affected. The second alarm truck companies pulled ceilings and opened walls to check for fire extension.

One civilian was transported for smoke inhalation and Red Cross was on scene to assist with nine people displaced.

Overall, 959 Powell Street was a large, fast-moving fire that could have easily escalated, if not for the aggressive actions of the first arriving companies. Engine 41 called a Working Fire just two minutes after dispatch and Engines 2 and 41 had hose lines on the fire shortly after. Trucks 2 and 13 quickly affected vertical ventilation and performed a rescue, respectively, within the first few

minutes after arriving on scene. The work established by these first arriving companies kept the fire from growing and allowed subsequent companies to extinguish the remaining fire.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Alarm** – (3/27/23) 2310 hours, 470 Bayshore Street, cross street Cortland. The cause of this fire was accidental. (Assistant Chief Nicol Juratovac)

### CONDITION UPON ARRIVAL

Engine 9 arrived and observed smoke showing from the rear of 470 Bayshore Boulevard. Engine 9 pulled into the Jack in the Box at 366 Bayshore to access the Charlie side of the fire building. Unable to access the fire from there, Engine 9 drove to the Charlie side of the fire building via Cortland Avenue on the corner of Bayshore Boulevard. Engine 9 led a 200' 1 3/4" Ready Line to extinguish fire on the Charlie/Delta corner of the fire building. It should be noted that they extinguished a fire that started from the interior of the fire building and extended to the exterior.

Engine 9 Officer reported that this was an exterior fire with some pallets on fire, as well. This information was later proven to be inaccurate as the origin of the fire was inside the Charlie/ Delta corner of the fire building that extended to the main showroom floor and burned through the exterior on the Charlie side.

Engine 42, the 2<sup>nd</sup> in Engine, identified the main body of fire emitting from the Charlie/Delta corner of the fire building and deployed a 200' 1 3/4" Ready Line through a metal gate and up the driveway in between the fire building and Delta Exposure. Truck 9 split its crew with two members ascending to the roof and two members committed to gaining entry to allow Engine 42's hose line lead. The two fire fighters from Truck 9 not only popped open the lock to the metal gate, but used their rotary saw to open up the wood warehouse door that led to the seat of the fire.

Battalion 10 arrived approximately at the same time as Division 3. Division 3 originally reported light smoke showing, which quickly changed to a working fire. Division 3 named Bayshore Command and the location of the Command Post as being on the Alpha/Delta corner in front of the fire building. Command assigned Battalion 10 as Fire Attack Group Supervisor directing and supervising two members of Truck 9 Interior, Engine 42, and Engine 9. Command assigned the other two members of Truck 9 Roof Division. They achieved vertical ventilation by first opening up the skylight and then by cutting a large 4X4 hole directly above the main body of fire. Roof Division ascended to the roof by throwing the 24' straight ladder on the Delta side of the fire building.

Command then assigned Engine 32 to Fire Attack and directed them to lead a 2 1/2" hose to the Alpha side of the fire building. At this time, the fire building was flanked by Engine 42 on the Charlie/Delta side, Engine 9 on Charlie, and Engine 32 on Alpha/Delta corner.

Rescue Squad 2 checked in at the Command Post and they were assigned as Search and Rescue Group Supervisor. Rescue Squad 2 began forcible entry on the Alpha side of the fire building.

Truck 11 arrived, and Command assigned them as Interior to work under Fire Attack. Command also directed them to secure a second means of egress from the roof for Roof Division. They did so by throwing the 35' extension ladder on the Alpha side. They then made entry to the Alpha side of the fire building with the assistance of Rescue Squad 2.

Command requested reconnaissance from both Roof Division and Engine 9. Specifically, Command wanted to know whether the fire area was the same building as Floorcraft, what type of roof it was (e.g., bow string truss, light weight truss construction, etc.), and whether there were any exposure buildings threatened on Charlie. Roof Division confirmed that the Charlie/ Delta area was in fact the same building as the showroom building. However, this was incorrect as the two warehouses were attached, but separated by a concrete wall on the bottom with wooden planks on top.

At that time, Engine 9 requested a water supply. Command struck a 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm due to the information received from Roof Division, particularly that fire was now impinging on to the showroom of the main warehouse.

The Safety Officer assisted in identifying that the fire had in fact extended to the Charlie/Delta corner of the main showroom floor. He also made sure Roof Division continued to operate safely and that they stayed away from the compromised section as they searched for fire extension. The Safety Officer also assisted crews with locating hot spots that were deep in the void spaces under the roof flashing and in between concrete walls and wooden planks. There were many void spaces in this structure due to many modifications made to it. He made sure that both Fire Attack and Roof Division worked in coordination to locate all hidden fire.
