



OPERATIONS REPORT

May 1 - May 31, 2023

GREATER ALARMS:

There were 2 Greater Alarm fires during this reporting period.

2nd Alarm – (5/9/23) 0104 hours, 6 Locksley Avenue, cross streets 6th Avenue and Lawton Street. There were three injuries. The cause of this fire was accidental. (Assistant Chief William Storti)

On May 2023, a full box was struck for 6 Locksley Avenue and dispatched at 0104 hours for an apartment on fire. Engine 22 was first on-scene and proceeded to investigate. Battalion 8 arrived at 0109 hours and declared a working fire. There were no delays in response or reporting and the alarm system had alerted the residents. Battalion 8 established Locksley command. Upon arrival there was heavy fire from an apartment on the second floor in the Bravo/Charlie corner, alarms reported in 2nd floor corridor and lobby and on the 5th and 10th floors. The elevators were not recalled by the elevator lobby alarm and had to be recalled manually later in the incident. There were also reports of occupants trapped on several floors and people jumping out of windows on the Charlie side. Division 2 arrived on-scene at 0114 hours, assumed command, and requested a 2nd alarm at 0120 hours. Engine 22 backed up by Engine 12 led two lines off the standpipe to the 2nd floor putting water on the fire. Engine 20 led a line to the floor above the fire. B08 was assigned to fire attack on the 2nd floor. Truck 12 was assigned to 2nd floor/fire attack and raised an aerial ladder to the Charlie side of the building. Truck 18 went to the 2nd floor and Charlie side of building to assist with immediate rescues. Rescue 2 conducted search and rescue and evacuated occupants throughout the building. Battalion 5 was assigned to safety and assisted rescues behind the building. Engine 40 was assigned to assist Medic units with victims, and then assigned RIC. Battalion 7 and Engine 21 were assigned to the lobby. Three victims, one with inhalation injuries and two with trauma from jumping from the 2nd floor, were transported to hospitals.

Strategy was to confine the fire to the apartment of origin with two lines to the fire and one above and evacuate the 2nd and 3rd floors with other floors sheltering in place. Immediate rescues complicated the fire, but all companies performed well. Truck 18 and Medic units carried out the first hose lead and rescues, respectively. Lobby controls were in a different building and with the immediate rescues, later companies were assigned to Lobby.

2nd Alarm – (5/22/23) 1143 hours, 3535 California Street, cross streets Locust and Spruce streets. There were no injuries. The cause of this fire was accidental. (Assistant Chief Ken Yee)

On May 22, 2023, at approximately 1143 hours, a full box was struck for 3535 California, a two-story commercial building. Engines 10, 38, and 21, Trucks 5 and 16, Battalion 4, Division 2, Rescue Squad 1 and Medic 81 were dispatched.

Captain Barden, Engine 38, arrived on scene, saw heavy smoke conditions coming from the rear of the reported location and declared a Working Fire. Battalion Chief Cercos, Battalion 4, arrived and ordered the next two engine companies to check for fire extension in the Bravo (3533 California) and Delta (3545 California) buildings. Lieutenant Fogle, Truck 5, split his crew, with two firefighters going to the roof.

The site of a retail business in the Laurel Village shopping area, 3535 California is located within a two-block stretch of commercial buildings. These two blocks are constructed similar to a strip mall, with multiple addresses sharing common attic spaces. Any fire entering the attic space in one location has the potential to quickly spread horizontally to cause damage to neighboring businesses.

After the fire was determined to be in the rear wall, BC Cercos declared a second alarm, fearing the fire had already traveled into the attic space and thus, needing more personnel to contain the fire from spreading further.

Recognizing the type of construction and after determining the location of the fire, firefighters quickly cut a hole in the roof, allowing the fire to vent vertically. At the same time, other firefighters aggressively opened the rear wall to access the fire for extinguishment, ensuring that damages to the neighboring businesses were limited to minor smoke damage.

There were no injuries or rescues associated with this incident, as the affected businesses were all evacuated prior to our arrival.

The incident at 3535 California was a fire in the rear wall of the building. If the fire spread into the attic space, this fire would have spread to neighboring businesses, causing significantly more damage. Due to the aggressive tactics and actions deployed by first arriving Chief Officers and companies, this fire was contained to the rear wall of the fire building.

WATER RESCUE

On 5/29/23, Memorial Day, at 1409 hours, Engine 17 was dispatched to 501 Hunters Point, the Candlestick Point State Park Recreation Area. Since there was a language barrier with the reporting party, this call was upgraded to a surf rescue as more information was received by DEC. There were 4 victims in the water. Engine 17 arrived on scene and was met by distraught family members.

The victims, 2 children and 1 adult, were part of an extended family holiday gathering. They launched kayaks from shore and were wearing pfds and ran into difficulties approximately 1/2 a mile offshore. All three individuals ended up in the water, out of the kayaks. An individual not related to the group had witnessed this incident and swam out to render aid, thus putting a fourth person in the water. It was later determined this unknown individual was not part of the family group, but rather a good Samaritan who had already left the scene.

Engine 17 led by Lt. Linney immediately assessed the situation and realized that the victims were drifting out from shore and in a southernly manner. Engine 17's crew then ran approximately 1/4 mile to the southern point and Firefighter Brandon Bowers, a surf rescue certified swimmer, immediately jumped in the Bay and began swimming to the victims. Lt. Dustin Stewart, Truck 17, another surf rescue certified swimmer, arrived shortly after Engine 17, and also ran approximately 1/4 mile and entered the water. Lt. Stewart instructed his crew to use arm signals to direct the rescue swimmers if need be.

Firefighter Bowers first reached the victims and began to assess their condition. He realized the children were in some level of distress and began swimming to shore with both children, an extremely difficult operation. According to Bowers, he "swam approximately 800m to get to the victims, and then approximately 600m towards shore before the SFPD Rescue Boat arrived on scene." Lt. Stewart attended to the adults, in particular the good Samaritan, who was now exhausted and feeling the effects of the frigid Bay water. Stewart also swam the same distance with the adult victims in tow.

SFPD Marine 1 arrived on scene and picked up all victims and rescue swimmers when the group was approximately 200m from shore. The young male was evaluated for potential hypothermia and transported along with his sister to UC Mission Bay for further evaluation. This successful rescue operation was also aided by Fire Boat 3 and its skiff. The skiff was able to take the victims from the SFPD boat and unload them on shore where they were met by medic units. SFO Rescue Boat, SFFD Rescue Boat 1, SFPD Marine 1, and a USCG Helicopter were also dispatched.


