OPERATIONS REPORT

July 1 – July 31, 2023

GREATER ALARMS:

There was one Greater Alarm fire during this reporting period.

2nd Alarm – (7/27/23) 2042 hours, 1242 19th Avenue, cross streets Lincoln Way and Irving Street. There were two injuries. The cause of this fire is under investigation. (Assistant Chief William Storti)

A full box was struck at 1242 19th Avenue at 2042 hours for an apartment on fire. Engine 22 was first on-scene and declared smoke showing then a working fire. Battalion 8 came on-scene and established 19th Avenue command. There were no delays in response or reporting but the smoke detectors had not alerted residents. However, smoke detectors and sprinkler system worked properly in the Bravo exposure. Upon arrival there was heavy smoke coming from the open garage with the residents all outside. E22 led a 150' ready line into the garage while E40 supplied and led the 200' ready line to the 2nd floor. B07 was assigned fire attack, while T12 assisted fire attack and T14 laddered B3 with an aerial and went to the roof of the fire building. After initial success in knocking down what turned out to be an extension of the fire, the fire spread to the 2nd floor and the Bravo walls. A 2nd alarm was struck, and lines were led to the Charlie side through Bravo, to the 2nd and 3rd floors and the Bravo roof. B08 was assigned Charlie while B02 was assigned to the 2nd floor and B05 was assigned Bravo. The fire was in the garage had been partitioned with plywood to form 6 rooms and the fire was in the rearmost room. This partition created confusion and a difficult job for the first arriving companies to find the fire.

Strategy at first was to get a quick knock on the fire but since there was a delay it changed to containing the fire on all sides then extinguishing. The coordination between fire attack and Charlie division to extinguish the fire in the rear was well done. Initially, while looking for fire the maze-like conditions and tight quarters in the basement caused a delay in finding the seat of the fire. It was a case that the door on the right was the correct route to find the fire on the left. Since the small hallways became crowded, Officers should stress the importance of the primary search and the overcrowding of hallways.

4th Alarm – (8/1/23) 0555 hours, 300 Octavia Street, cross streets Oak and Hickory streets. There were no injuries. The cause of this fire is under investigation. (Assistant Chief William Storti)









As you all know by now, we have 6 new members and this class was 100% ALL VOLUNTEERS!

Please welcome FF Robbin Hewitt, FF/PM Kris Moore, FF John McGee, FF John Murnane, FF Chris Ordenez and FF/PM Al Selva.

This was the first class in quite a long time to complete their MAO badging BEFORE the end of class and also to get a special tour of the Air Traffic Control Tower and simulator (thanks to Chief Crean for coordinating with Tower). The nice thing about the tour was that we had the opportunity to ask Mark Sherry direct questions about ATC communications which I took full advantage of. Below are 3 questions I asked and his answers which I hope clears up any uncertainty:

Q: Do we need to specify how many apparatus are on a single crossing or can we just say "and company"?

A: Just say "and company".

Q: If we need to proceed onto a runway to the subject aircraft and in the process of traveling to the aircraft we also cross over the intersecting runways, must we stop and ask permission again?

A: No. This is commonly confused with the rules that apply to Airside Operations who MUST ask permission. For the Fire Dept, when told to "proceed to subject aircraft", it is assumed that fire will go directly to the subject aircraft



without stopping. There is NO need to stop again and ask for permission as it is expected that we will cross the intersecting runways.

Q: If an emergency vehicle is on a runway or taxiway inspecting an aircraft and the aircraft is later told to proceed off the runway(s), are we still presumed to be able to follow the aircraft past the hold bars since we were already granted permission to proceed to subject aircraft?


A: When aircraft are exiting the runways following being assessed by emergency vehicles, we should always ask permission to cross any hold bars or ask for clarification to follow the subject aircraft off of the runways. The best procedure is to treat it like another crossing and ask ATC for permission. This is especially important when the emergency vehicle is leaving the scene in another direction and still in between or on a runway.

These were but a few questions however we will be holding in-service training pertaining specifically to Nomenclature & Technicalities of Movement on the RSA over June 26-29th. If you can't make the training, we will have make-up sessions in July. It is my hope to continue to keep the relationship between ATC and Fire open so that there is no confusion over proper




Another way to get practice on accessing aircraft is by working with the airlines that utilize props to train their flight staff.


Red Cap. Re-Cap

This month's Red Cap drill was a simulated lithium-ion battery fire on a Canadian Airlines, Boeing 767 aircraft which reported smoke in the cabin upon landing. The purpose of the drill was to not only hone in our skills for an Alert 3 response to an aircraft evacuation, but also to improve our communications and collaboration with other SFO agencies such as Airside Ops, SFPD, Duty Managers, Facilities and Customs & Border Control to name a few. Hopefully, we also got a clearer idea of how airline attendants are trained to handle lithium-ion battery fires that occur in flight. They are trained to first use a Halon fire extinguisher if flames are seen. Then, once the fire is under control (or if only smoking), crew don safety gloves and goggles and place the offending battery in a "burn bag" which is essentially a metal shell. From there, crew can isolate it in a safe location such as in a restroom sink to douse in water or in the oven.



Another important take-away is the importance of following ICS organizational structure. As a reminder, units will respond & identify as their assigned unit until such time that the IC assigns a specific role to units on scene. Never should a company self-assign themselves as a "group" (functional area) or "division" (geographical area). The IC will make the determination of what group or division to assign based on the incident which will dictate to the IC the best strategy & tactics. For example, RS48 would respond as "Rescue 48" and report to the IC as RS48 until such time that the IC assigns them as "rescue group" (for example). At that time, R48 will then refer to themselves as "rescue group" when updating the IC. Furthermore, any units assigned to RG would report directly to the rescue group rather than to the IC. Example: R54 is assigned to rescue group to assist with S & R. R54 locates 2 non-ambulatory passengers and needs assistance with extrication. R54 would inform and make that request to the rescue group officer who then reports to the IC directly. The exception being anytime there is emergency traffic or a mayday situation. Please refer to the SFFD ICS manual for further clarification...




