

  - 10 Participants (5 wearing Fire-Dex & 5 wearing Lion) have been filling out daily logs and the IAFF will be collecting them.
  - They will then hand them over to the SFFD
  - 2 Companies being compared is Fire-Dex & Lion Turnouts
- SFFCPF Nutrition Study (Fall / Winter)
  - SFFCPF, SFFD & Stanford
  - Dr. Christophe Gardner (Stanford) Nutrition Research Group
  - Duration: 8 weeks
  - Plant Based Diet vs. Meat & Dairy Diet
- PTSI/ Sleep Disorder Study (Ends in August)
  - National Center for PTSD, Dissemination & Training Division
    - VA Palo Alto Health Care System

- Recruiting Active and Retired Firefighters
  - Firefighters often experience posttraumatic injury (PTSI) and sleep problems that can impair their functioning at work and at home.
  - They are recruiting active and retired firefighters to participate in a pilot study evaluating a 4-day treatment workshop to address symptoms of PTSI, insomnia, and nightmares.
  - In a small pilot study, this treatment was found to be helpful for activeduty military personnel.
  - Participants in this study, will be asked to attend a 4-day group treatment workshop in Kansas City (food and accommodation provided).
  - Firefighters from the same department will not be enrolled in the same intervention group.
  - BHU has identified 2 members to attend
- SFFD Study of Overhaul and Respiratory Protection
  - SFFD, UC Berkely. Silent Spring Institute, Cal/OSHA, SFFCPF, National Fire Service Women (NFSW)
  - Study is going to be comparing SCBA vs. Powered Air Purifying Respirator (PAPR's) during overhaul
  - AB 700 California Firefighter Cancer Prevention and Research Program
    - June 13<sup>th</sup> proposal submitted, expect to hear back November, 13<sup>th</sup>, 2024
    - Cal/OSHA is granting an experimental variance to allow test the use of PAPR's instead of SCBA
    - Study will involve 4 Phases.
      - Phase 1 is in a controlled environment, if SCBA proves to provide more respiratory protection then the PAPR's, the study will stop.
      - If the study shows that PAPR's have as good as the SCBA, then the study will continue in the field with Truck Companies participating, wearing the PAPR's for respiratory protection

### Fireboat/Energetix DOT Testing Program

The Fireboat testing is now under the random testing program and the names are added to the draw pool daily from Datco Services.

### **Random Alcohol and Drug Testing Program**

The Random Alcohol and Drug Testing Program is in compliance for the month of June.

#### Post-Accident Alcohol and Drug Testing Program

One post-Accident Alcohol and Drug test was administered by ISB during the month of June. Two Battalion Chiefs (Winn and Oconnell) have completed and passed all online and hands on Designator Collector training.

Two Battalion Chiefs (Cercos and Kasper) have completed and passed the online training for Designated Collector. Hands on training will be complete early July.

### Conditional Offer, Promotional and End-of-Probation Alcohol and Drug Testing Program

Thirty-two Members participated in new hire, promotional, and end of probation Alcohol and Drug Testing.

-Capt. Weddle ensured that the doctor's office had all necessary supplies for Drug and Alcohol testing.

#### **Breathalyzers**

All current Breathalyzer being used in the field including Div2, Div3, Airport, ISB, and doctors office have been accuracy tested in the month of June. Three breathalyzers that were sent to intoximeter for recalibration have been completed.

#### California Driver Licenses (CDL)

Cpt Weddle continued to monitor all Dept members Drivers Licenses via CA DMV Pull Notifications. All necessary updates have been made i.e. Add new employees to the system and remove retired employees from the database.

#### Training

Cpt Weddle participated in a train the trainer Auto Extrication class during the month of June. Capt. Weddle deployed on two wildland incidents. Sites fire in the Mendicino and Thompson Fire outside Oroville, CA.

#### **Background Investigations**

Background investigations for the September H3L1 class have begun. Twenty two candidates have been selected for the background process. All H3L1 candidates will be using the new Medic Recruitment portal.

## Support Services – ADC Michael Mullin June 2024

## FACILITY MAINTENANCE & PLANNING (June Waechtler, SFFD)

- A total of 110 requests for service were initiated during the month of June, 2024.
- 103 service orders were completed and closed out in June, 2024.

#### **PLUMBING**

- Eighteen service calls were placed to resolve minor plumbing issues (faucet, toilet, urinal repairs; clogged sinks, shower drains) in the month of June, 2024. All issues were addressed by DPWs Plumbers.
- Two sewage backups were reported during this month (42, 8).
- One new water heater was installed this month (1415 Evans).

#### HVAC/HEATING/BOILER

**FS 23:** Heater in Officer's Room needs to be replaced including new t-stats, on-off switch. Drying Room needs new heater and exhaust fan. Modifying controls to include timer and on/off switch in or outside Drying Room. Waiting for quote from DPW's Steamfitters Shop for two heaters, one exhaust fan and the necessary control work. Quote received from DPW; in for ADC of Support Service's review. Status Update: ADC of Support Services requested that a quote be provided just for the fan coil replacement. Steamfitters are proposing to modify the existing estimate and resend mid-July.

FS 5: Boiler needs new flue to be fabricated by DPW Sheetmetal Shop; after fabrication and installation of new flue, DPW Steamfitters will run new drain and condensate neutralizer. DPW's Steamfitters Shop determined that this work should be reassigned to DPWs Sheet Metal Shop. Waiting for quote for fabrication from Sheet Metal Shop. Quote received from DPW's Sheetmetal Shop; in for ADC of Support Service's review. Scope of Work has been approved by Support Services and material is in procurement. Waiting for materials. Materials have arrived. DPW Steamfitters will schedule unit to be shut down so that new flue can be incorporated. New flue installation is complete and drains have been installed. DPW Steamfitters will be performing start up of unit week of June 3rd. Status Update: Work complete. FS 28: Flushed entire heating system and strainers of fan coil and air handlers; will replace 3 tstats. Pump was replaced and 2 of the 3 T-stats have been replaced. The last of the 3 T-stats installed in March. New equipment is not syncing with older equipment plus multiple zones with inadequate heat. Additional control valves and thermostats are needed. Quoted 3 days labor plus \$3,000 parts which was approved by ADC Mullin. New thermostats and control valves have been received and need to be installed. Installation scheduled for mid-July. New control module was installed on air handler. T-stats and control valves still need to be added to the 4 heating zones. We are complete with 3 of the control valves and t-stats. Steamfitters need to install 2 more control valves (which were buried in ceiling). All new thermostats and control valves have been replaced. Additional issues remain: HHW pump is making grinding noise and control valves on the roof units are becoming severely compromised by exposure to the elements. DPW proposing to replace one pump and 2 control valves with weather shield for the

roofing units. Waiting for equipment and labor cost estimate. The new pump and valves with the weather shield comes to \$4,600 installation will take approximately 2 men to install in two days. Waiting for ADC of Support Services approval to proceed. Approved by Support Services. Waiting for parts to be procured. Material is in; waiting for labor. New control valves were installed and heat is on in the dorm and other areas of station. Insulating of rooftop is next. Steamfitters are monitoring the heating system's operations. Insulation on roof is complete. Still have one day of control wiring to complete on roof which will include adding a control box on the roof to fit the zone controller. Status Update: DPW will schedule labor for 1 day to clean up the exposed control wire on the roof after HVAC start up at St 9. Currently waiting for labor.

FS 14: New pulleys, motors and belts were installed on the station's exhaust extractor system to improve intake. Fan not performing as designed. A rep from Nederman (manufacturer of the exhaust extractor) came on-site for inspection, and recommended a different exhaust fan for the exhaust extractor. HVAC installation is complete. Nederman exhaust fan had to replaced and has been ordered; ETA is 3 months. DPW Steamfitters are still waiting for fan procurement. Issued PO to Air Filtration on 5/25/23. Fan expected to be delivered mid-October. New fan has arrived. DPW anticipates swapping out unit will take two men two days of labor to accomplish. Installation anticipated to be completed in January, 2024. Replacement fan arrived. Status Update: Waiting for labor.

FS 22: Re-circ pumps need to be replaced. DPW Steamfitters to conduct walk thru with Support Services then provide estimate for re-pipe. Moving forward with estimate for re-pipe. Status Update: Waiting for funding transfer.

FS 9: ESTIMATES RECEIVED from DPW Steamfitters to replace 3 rooftop HVAC units: \$149,701.72.

Submitted approval to DPW/BBR to proceed with work as quoted. DPW Steamfitters submitted a quote for new equipment on 7/31/23. Equipment is due to arrive shortly. Given that FS 26's furnace install is nearing completion, DPW Steamfitters can start on FS 9's AHU replacement. Roof will be open for 1 week while sheetmetal is building curbs for the new units. Postponed until 1 week of clear weather is in forecast. Lift to remove old units off roof is scheduled for Monday, May 13. Curb adapters will be fabricated, and units will be set in place. 2nd lift TBD. Lift Review Meeting is scheduled for Friday, May 10th. Status Update: Old units were removed, and the curbs were fabricated. Lift to set new equipment was been rescheduled to Monday, June 17th, 8:00 am. Steamfitters propose to complete gas piping and drains mid-July. Sheet metal will be done with the economizers and powered exhaust fans mid-July. Extra items that were not included with the unit: 1) Hail guard for the coils; 2) Exhaust extension piece to prevent flue gas from being pulled into the economizer; 3) a fuse block terminal at the power exhaust fan. These items were identified upon installation.

FS 13: ESTIMATE RECEIVED for Furnace/Forced air units in dorm; price also includes replacing exiting ductwork: preliminary estimate \$80,000. Awaiting formal ESTIMATE from DPW/BBR. DPWs Steamfitters made a temporary repair, however 2/4 zones have bad heat exchangers and gas is locked out. Troubleshooting is continuing. Unit is working with temporary repair in place. Received estimate for \$104,888.00. Waiting for ADC of Support Services to approve quote. Approved by Support Services. Waiting for labor availability and funding transfer. DPW Steamfitters are reviewing system operations of new units at St 26 then they will replicate system for St 13 as per discussion with Support Service's Assistant Deputy Chief and Stationary Engineer. Still discussing which units to purchase with SFFD Stationary Engineer. Status Update: Waiting for equipment to be approved by Support Services. Steamfitters also propose surveying the electrical panel as discussed with SFFD.

- FS 12: Boiler re-pipe proposal. Received revised quote from DPW Steamfitters \$ 72,025.26. Waiting for ADC of Support Services to approve quote. Approved by Support Services. Waiting for labor availability and funding transfer. Waiting for material. Material has arrived; DPW will schedule labor to install new pumps and piping. Status Update: Waiting for labor.
- FS 41: Boiler controls proposal. Received revised quote from DPW Steamfitters \$ 23,559.83. Waiting for ADC of Support Services to approve quote. Approved by Support Services. Status Update: Order of new relays and wire has arrived; DPW will schedule labor to replace contactors and relays in the control panel. Waiting for labor.
- FS 25: New radiator needed in Ladies Locker Room. Unit costs \$9,000 plus \$1,000 in parts. Anticipate 30 hours of labor needed. Deferred. Zone valves have been replaced. Status Update: Work has been completed.
- FS 37: RADIATORS It was discovered that 17 radiators need new valves to control on/off. Nine (9) of the units do not work. Waiting for proposal to change out all valves. Drying Room Heater needs a 3-way valve and an outdoor air override that needs to be installed. Proposing two men to take nine (9) days, plus \$3500 in parts. The heat is on in the Station and the new program settings are adequate to get through the winter. Work will need to be done when they are permitted to shut Boiler down for a few days. Waiting for formal quote to be sent to ADC Support Services for sign off. Status Update: Deferred.
- FS 43: DPW Steamfitters are investigating intermittent heat issues on 1st Floor. Waiting for findings. There is an existing radiant heating system on the 1st floor of the Station. Steamfitters are proposing to see if they can repair system which could resolve the heating issue. Steamfitters advise if unit is not repairable, they propose designing a new heating system for the 1st floor. Status Update: Project under consideration by Support Services.
- FS 3: A temporary water heater had to be installed the first week of May due to insufficient hot water production. DPW Steamfitters are preparing quote to replace old unit. Quote received and approved. Status Update: Replacement installation is complete.

#### CEMENT/ASPHALT

No major cement issues were reported.

## **EXHAUST EXTRACTORS**

FSs 10 (3), 3, 19 and 28 reported issues with their Station's exhaust extractors. All issues have been resolved and units have been returned to service. FS 23 reported issues with station's exhaust extractor. Waiting for quote from vendor who will provide specialized fabrication. Unit is working but it runs loudly. Received quote which includes a stainless steel exterior fan to prevent premature rusting. Processing purchase order. Status Update: Waiting on delivery date.

#### **GENERATORS**

No generators were scheduled for annual maintenance service and load bank testing during June, 2024. FS 9's generator repair is still pending resolve.

## GLASS/WINDOWS/SCREENS

No major glass/window/screens issues were reported.

### **CARPENTRY**

No major carpentry issues were reported.

## **ELECTRICAL**

No major electrical issues were reported.

#### LANDSCAPING

Requested DPW/Bureau of Forestry to perform site inspection of the trees surrounding FS 10 (over 80 trees in total) to determine if any were diseased, at risk of toppling, etc. Site inspection was performed; waiting for a written report on findings but nothing needed immediate attention. A site visit with BUF on May 11th revealed that several trees need significant pruning and thinning. Waiting for written estimate for tree trimming. Received estimate to remove large overlapping branches that overhang station parking lot, back of building plus work to include elevating branches over sidewalk and parking spaces: Crew of 5 for 3 days \$20,959.34. All 80 plus trees are within the Fire Department's property line and are not funded for maintenance through the Public Works Street Tree SF Program, therefore, we are responsible for all maintenance. Forwarded estimate to CFO to schedule work for next fiscal year. Next trim should be scheduled within the next 3-5 years. ADC of Support Services will meet with CFO in August to discuss this FYs budget and determine how to proceed. Project on hold as other more pressing issues must take precedence. Status Update: Received approval for funding. Waiting for labor availability.

FS 39 Submitted request to Bureau of Forestry to provide report on the vitality of the large trees that incorporate landscape at FS 39.

## E.S.E.R.—Emergency Firefighting Water System (EFWS), SFPUC

- Clarendon Supply EFWS Pipeline Construction reached substantial completion January 2024. Continued to address closeout items, expected final completion by Fall 2024.
- Fireboat Manifold Planning for new pipeline and fireboat manifold near Fort Mason Pier 2 and Pier 35.5 for fire suppression continued. Draft Alternative Analysis Report (AAR) was distributed for stakeholder's review.

• Fireboat Station 35 (\$50.5M) – Certificate of Final Completion was issued on November 11, 2022. Final Payment Application to Swinerton/Power, JV was approved on 7/10 followed by the final release of retention on 7/12/2022. Project is in the Warranty Period.

[M. Rossetto] FS35 Security gate enhancement has emerged as a high priority for SFFD. Permit applications have been submitted to both BCDC and the Port. BCDC

comments have been received and responses underway. 6/26/24 BCDC states that the permit application is compete and that their deadline is now 9/24/24 to issue the amendment. However, BCDC has committed to issuing a draft amendment for review by the end of July.



## Focused Scope Program (Michael Rossetto, San Francisco Public Works):

Total Funding allocated for the Focused Scope Program is \$21,407,279, approved by SFFD on 8/17/17. Work is complete in 8 of 9 of the Focused Scope categories comprising Roofing, Apparatus Bay Door Replacements, Exterior Envelope Improvements, Windows, Showers, HVAC/Mechanical, Sidewalk/Slabs, and Security Access Control. Work continues to progress through the last scope category, Generator Replacements.

## **Emergency Generators:**

- FS 2 Scope of work: replace existing rooftop generator set, structurally strengthen roof structure to support new fuel tank with capacity for 72-hour run time and provide new fuel fill port and piping to generator.
   This project is complete.
- O FS 19 Scope of work: replace existing generator at grade and replace main electrical panel. Construction phase review of submittals underway with the contractor MIK. DPW-BUF contacted to review health and pruning/removal needs of trees adjacent to the fire station. BUF agrees that the large tree adjacent to the generator is not healthy and should be removed. A fee proposal will be reviewed with the SFFD.
- **FS 14** Scope of work: replacement of existing generator with new rooftop generator, new subgrade fuel fill port at the sidewalk in front of the station, and new fuel piping from sidewalk to generator.
  - DPW-BOA has been approved to re-initiate the project with a concepts phase to validate changing the generator from a rooftop to a ground-mounted location that will be fuel-filled by hand in lieu of piped. The concepts drawing was delivered to SFFD on 4/29/24 and approved. A pre-application with Fire Prevention will follow.
  - Design proposal from BOA submitted to BPM, under review.

## **Exterior Envelope:**

- o **Package 1 (FS 8, 20, 23, 29)** FS 8, 20, and 29 are complete; On 1/15/21, SFFD requested a hold on FS 23 painting due to other priorities.
- o **Package 2 (FS 24, 34)** This project remains on HOLD initially placed at the request of Capital Planning in order to provide supplemental funding to the Police TC&FSD project. It is now expected that those funds will be returned to the SFFD for allocation to a priority project, possibly FS24 and/or FS34.
- o **FS 17 & 31** Exterior Envelopes were requested as new projects by SFFD in August 2023, both as lower priorities. These were approved by the Capital Planning Committee for use of ESER 2014 interest. A waterproofing consultant is recommended to determine corrective measures and potential costs.

#### **Miscellaneous:**

FS35 Security Fence Enhancements, FS17 Boiler Replacement & FS 29 Apparatus Bay Door Replacement were requested as new projects by SFFD in August 2023. These are ranked as the highest priority (most urgent) projects after the Network Modernization project.

## **Operations**

June was a proactive month with preparation for multiple stories, including the PG&E exercise. Fireworks and fire safety messaging were prepared and released. The PIO unit continues to monitor and respond to most large-scale incidents or incidents of public interest, including fires, rescues, and hazardous materials incidents. To remain proactive, the PIO Unit created and released a Glossary of Terms for media outlets to standardize reporting and limit calls, messages, and emails to the PIO during incidents. Since all media outlets listen to radio traffic, this glossary allows them to update the community in almost real-time, using a common language for the audience. Think of it as a "Firefighter to Citizen Translation Guide."

## **Events and Community Engagement**

Continued participation in Community Outreach Events remains mainly a reporting element instead of a participatory element. This continued divestment allows the PIO Unit to focus on messaging, branding, and Information requests. In contrast, CORE members can focus on events and spread fire safety information, and having multiple units coordinate events delayed participation by all.

## **Training**

FEMA credentialing is in process for full-time members of the PIO Unit. Members are also seeking out additional state-level classes as time allows.

## **Equipment**

Most interviews have transitioned to remote setup, and in addition to lighting and sound equipment, the PIO Office will deploy branded backdrops for events and interviews to further the unit's messaging.

The PIO buggy was detailed (waxed, deep clean) by PIO members this month.

## **Technology**

We are working with MMS to improve our ability to provide live streaming at events and, eventually, incidents if needed. The PIO unit does not have the hardware to transmit live feeds reliably nor the personnel available to deploy multiple cameras, monitor feed status, and emcee an event.

At a few events in June, we could not utilize safety messaging due to low cell service and Wi-Fi. We were able to set up the SAT Wi-Fi on one call, but this takes time to set up. DTIS is aware of the zones with bad reception. Using STARLINK would significantly improve our ability to provide safety messaging in the future and during a significant disaster.

We have been working with Hector from I.T. to enhance the use of AXON for capturing events and storing digital media.

We continue to review with MMS a platform for videos, such as YouTube. In the past, members would pay for this out of pocket.

We are working on moving away from that to obtain a department-paid site where all our videos can be posted for internal and external use.

The MMS digital team was used in the field at several events this month, with a positive and rewarding yield. We hope to expand on this in the future.

The PIO Unit still struggles to send out mass Media Messaging due to account freezes with vendors.

## **Facility**

870 Bush continues to become more of a home for the BHU and PIO units. Multiple neighbors have stopped in to comment about the drastic improvement in the block since PIO took over 24-hour staffing. Neighbors note a change in the appearance of the block, the foot traffic, and the smell. Some who view the backyard space are excited to see it be used again as work continues to clear the overgrowth and work with BHU on how best to use it. The front area was cleaned and polished, and information tablets for the public were placed on the front gates.



Vandalism in the form of destruction of informational signs continues; solutions are in the works.

Parking IFO the residence continues to be challenging, even after the red curb was repainted and legal spots were marked on the block. The two signs noting "No parking between signs—Fire Station" were removed suddenly by DPW in late May, and we have yet to get an answer as to why.

The apparatus bay was recently steam-cleaned and polished by the PIO team. This has made it more welcoming for the many members of the public who stop daily out of curiosity and to say hello. The carpet in the building is still awaiting a much-needed deep cleaning. Nonetheless, the PIO team spent some time hand-scrubbing spots to beautify and clean the location.

In May, the upstairs sleeping (dorm area) windows and wall trim were cleaned, along with the bathrooms, which were deep cleaned.

## **Recommendations:**

We recommend that when a committee, bureau, division, group, or entity has an event such as training, community engagement, drills, or noteworthy gatherings, a calendar





invite in Outlook be sent to the PIO so we can be aware of it, help with media if needed, and cover the event if required, among many other benefits.

We recommend adding two more suppression-level backup PIO members (preferably from MMS) to the unit.
