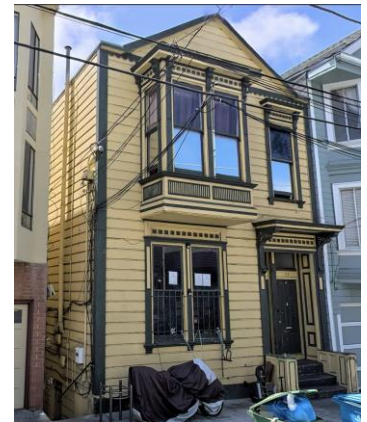
Summary

On February 22, 2025, at 08:09 hours, a full box was struck for a reported fire at 143 Blake St. This challenging fire in a modified three story (two above grade and one below grade) single-family residence underscores the importance of communication between units operating on the fire ground.

Sequence of Events

While en-route, units were informed of multiple calls by dispatch. Engine 10 arrived first on scene and declared a working fire. An occupant urgently reported that a woman was trapped on the bottom floor, pointing to a window in the tradesman's entrance, which was being used for occupant access and egress. Just past this entrance was a tall gate secured with a bike lock, blocking access to the rear of the building.

Engine 10 advanced a 150' ready-line through the window in the tradesman to search for the fire and victims on the sub-level. Engine 21 arrived second and supplied Engine 10. Engine 21 led a 200' ready-line up the front stairs to conduct search operations.



Engine 21 encountered heavy smoke but found no fire or victims. Truck 10 laddered the roof and reported heavy smoke coming from the Charlie side.

Division 2 arrived and took command, assigning Battalion 7 as Fire Attack.

Truck 5 provided a secondary means of egress from the roof, forced entry to the tradesman gate by cutting the bike lock, and assisted with hose advancement. Fire Attack advised Engine 10 that the fire was deeper in the building and directed Engine 31 to advance a large line to the Charlie side. All rear doors and windows were secured with OSB boards. After forcible entry by Truck 5 and Rescue Squad 1, Engine 31 quickly extinguished the fire. A total of 12 people were evacuated from the building.



Safety Issues for Review

Initial companies took an unusual approach through a sub-level window due to a report of a victim and building security measures. The hose lead made through the primary access and egress to the sub-level was complicated by construction modifications. The modification of the sub-level delayed the Engine Company from finding the actual fire location. Fire Attack made a decision to change tactics and engage the fire from a different access point on the Charlie side of the building. Fire Attack made appropriate communications over the tactical channel and ensured personnel were aware of a change in strategy.

Operations note:

Any access to a structure that is not standard shall be taken only in instances where the increased risk is proportionate to the increase in reward. Members must be aware and maintain the ability to immediately retreat should fire conditions change.

Changes in fire ground strategy or tactics must be clearly stated over the incident tactical channel. Chief Officers shall maintain communication and direction over all Companies assigned and ensure any change in operations is agreed upon, safe, and understood by all.

Sequence of Events

On February 25, 2025, at 14:58, Engine 17 was dispatched to a medical aid at 3rd and Palou. Once on the apparatus floor, the doorbell rang, and a neighbor stated a home was on fire across the street.

The crew of Engine 17 notified Truck 17 of the fire across the street and made a radio transmission to dispatch for a working fire at 1301 Shafter Street. Engine 17 and Truck 17 would be operating for quite some time without additional support and supervision.

Engine 17 and Truck 17 positioned their rigs to facilitate hose leads and ladder deployment. Crews heard screams coming from inside on the second floor. Engine 17's FF/PM and an FF/EMT member from Truck 17 went to the second floor to perform a primary search. On the second floor, the search team encountered heavy smoke and hoarder conditions. Despite these adverse decisions, their primary search resulted in the safe removal of an elderly victim from the fire floor. During this time, Engine 17 Officer and FF/EMT lead a 150' 1 3/4" handline to the second floor, Truck 17 Officer and FF/EMT split their crew to ladder the fire building and perform vertical



ventilation. Engine 17 Driver secured their own primary water supply from the LPH across the street. Engine 17 Officer and FF/EMT located the fire on the second floor and extinguished it. Truck 17 Officer and FF/EMT performed vertical ventilation and a secondary search which led to the discovery of two canines. One canine was resuscitated on-scene and later secured by Animal Control. The female elderly victim was transported to St. Francis for a burn evaluation and smoke inhalation.

The victim's outcome would surely have been fatal without the swift decisive actions of the crews of Engine 17 and Truck 17.

Safety Issues for Review

Conducting search operations without a hose line in place on the fire floor and floor above the fire is inherently risky. This calculated risk must always evaluate the potential reward.

Operations note:

Companies operating prior to a full box assignment must take precautions knowing later arriving companies will be delayed. In the initial stages of these incidents, crews can be task saturated and thin on resources. Officers must prioritize life, fire suppression, and incident stabilization.

Use of an aerial ladder vs wood extension ladders to two story building must consider deployment time and be weighed with the impact of losing a Truck member at the turntable.

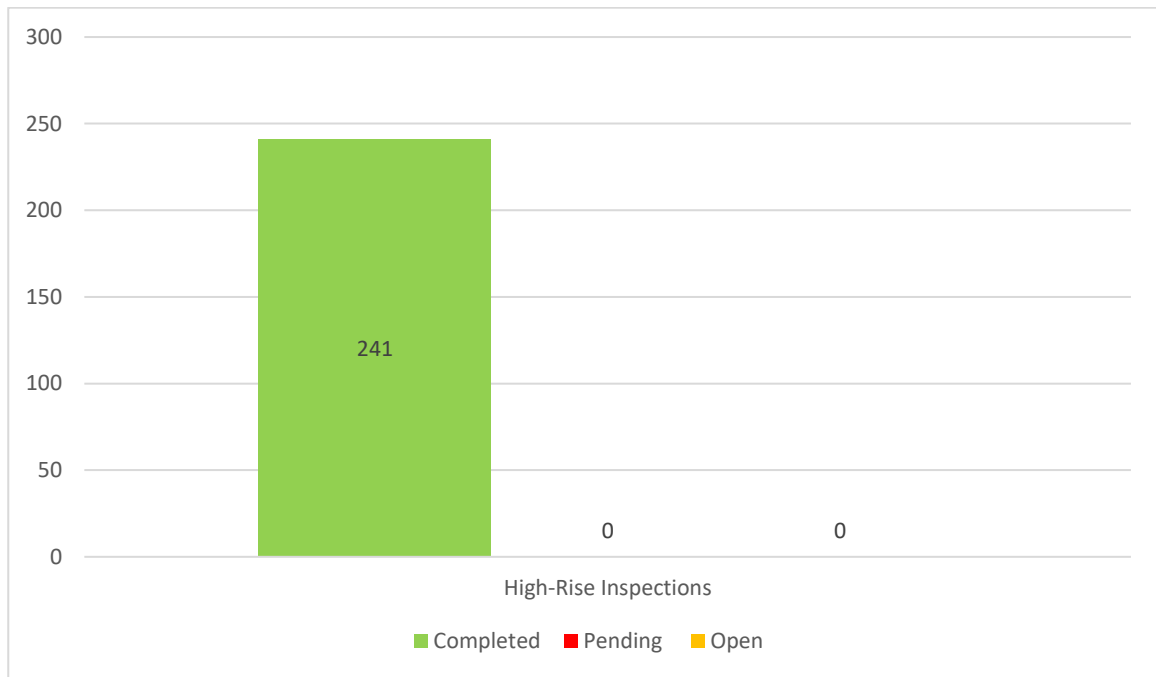

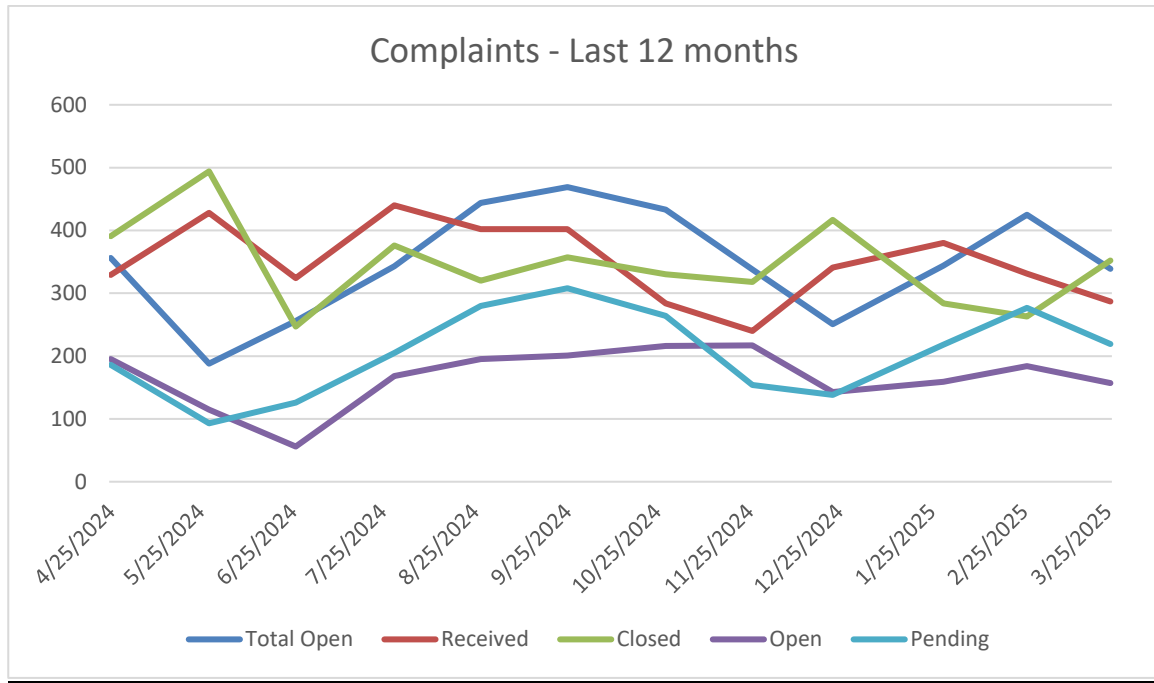

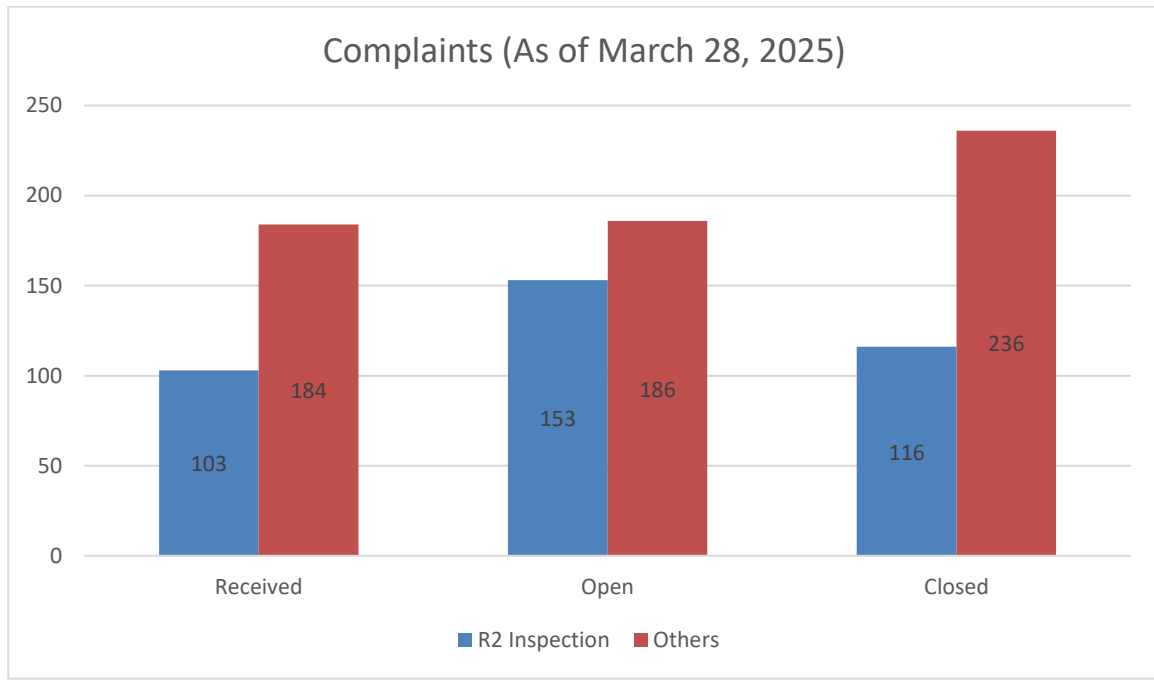

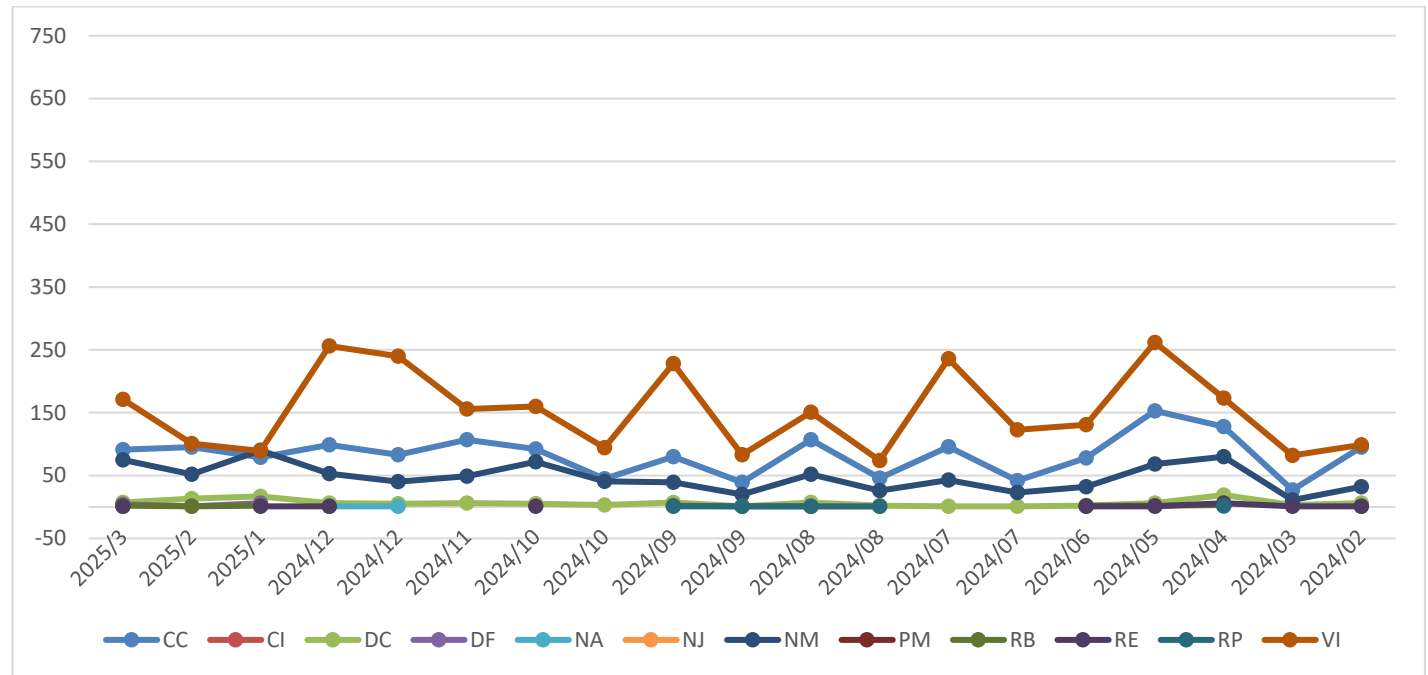

Residential Buildings w/ 9+ units for the last 12 months



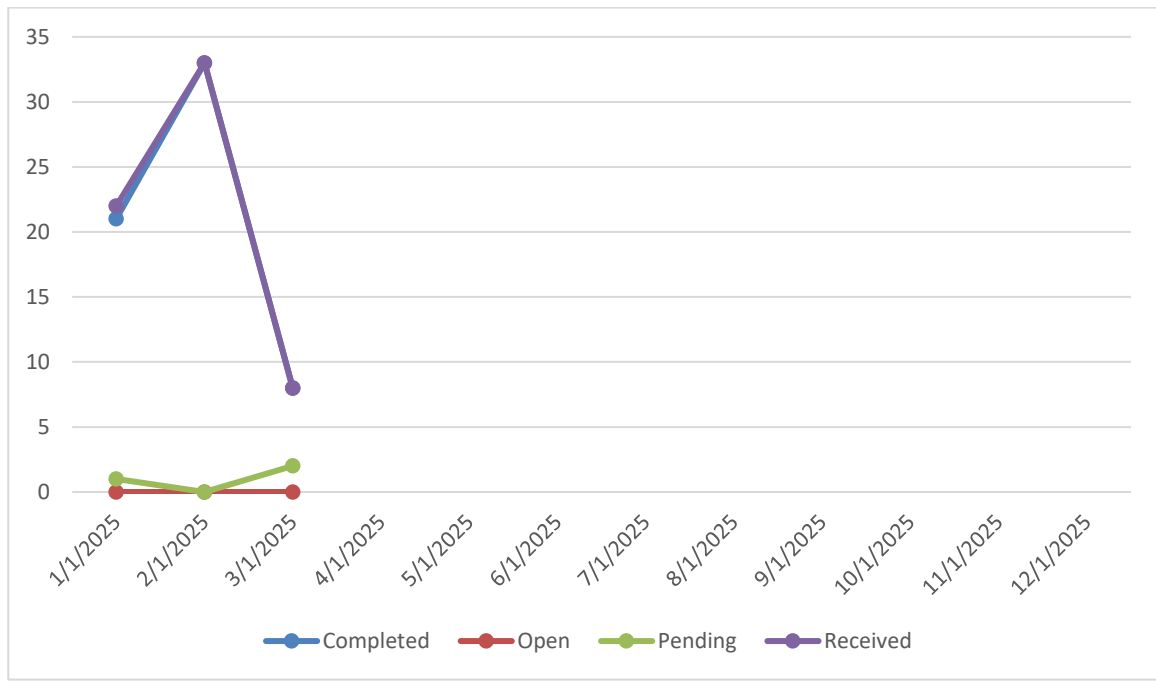

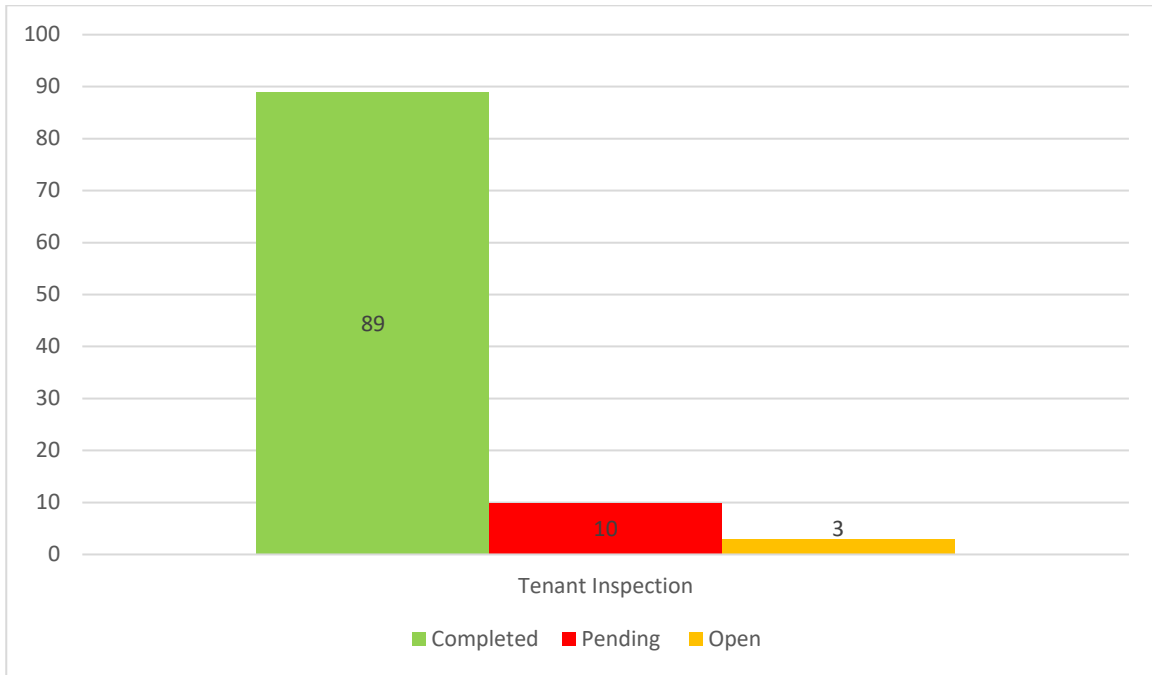

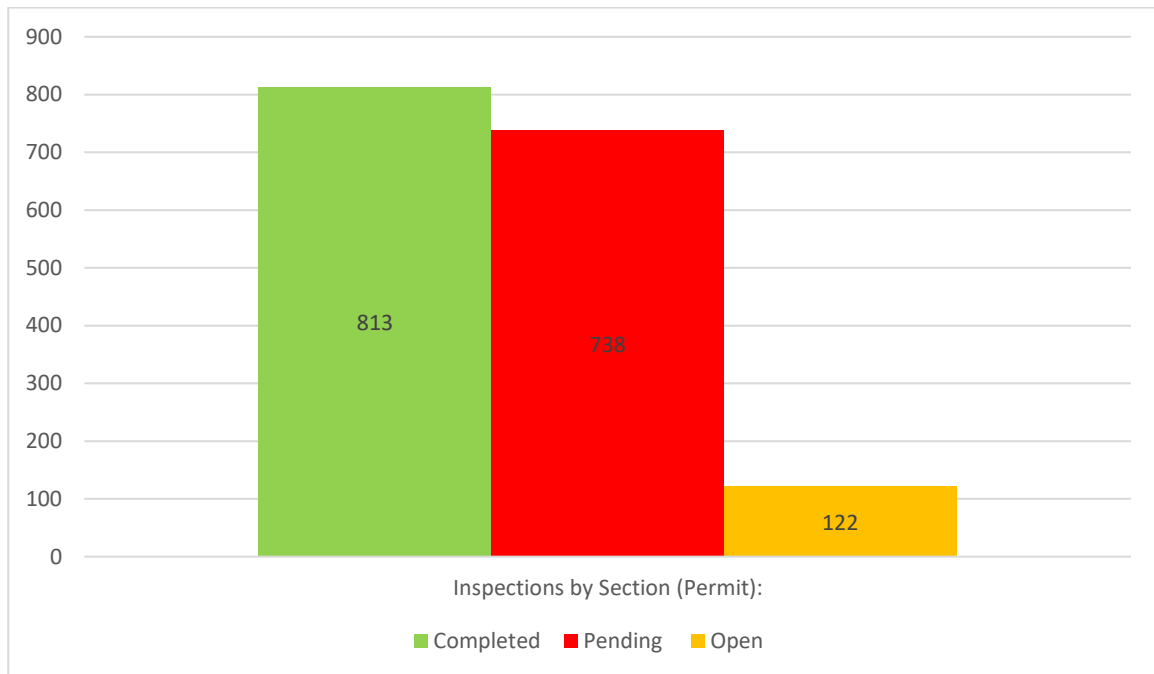

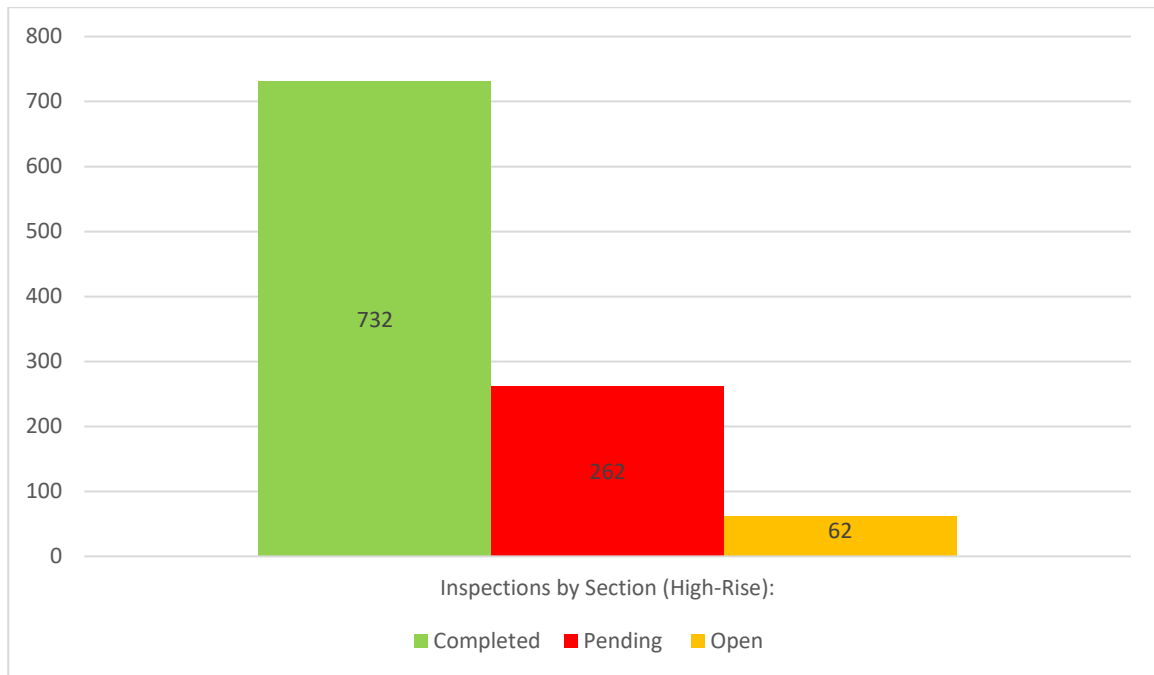

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (Permits Section)



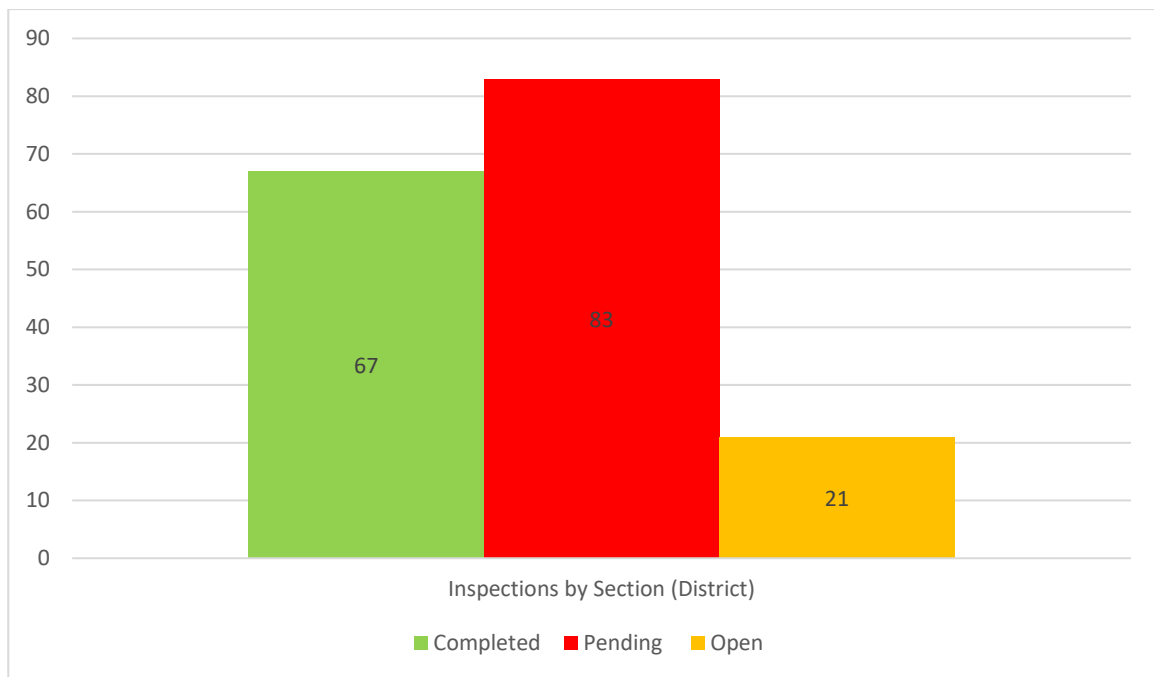

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (High-Rise)



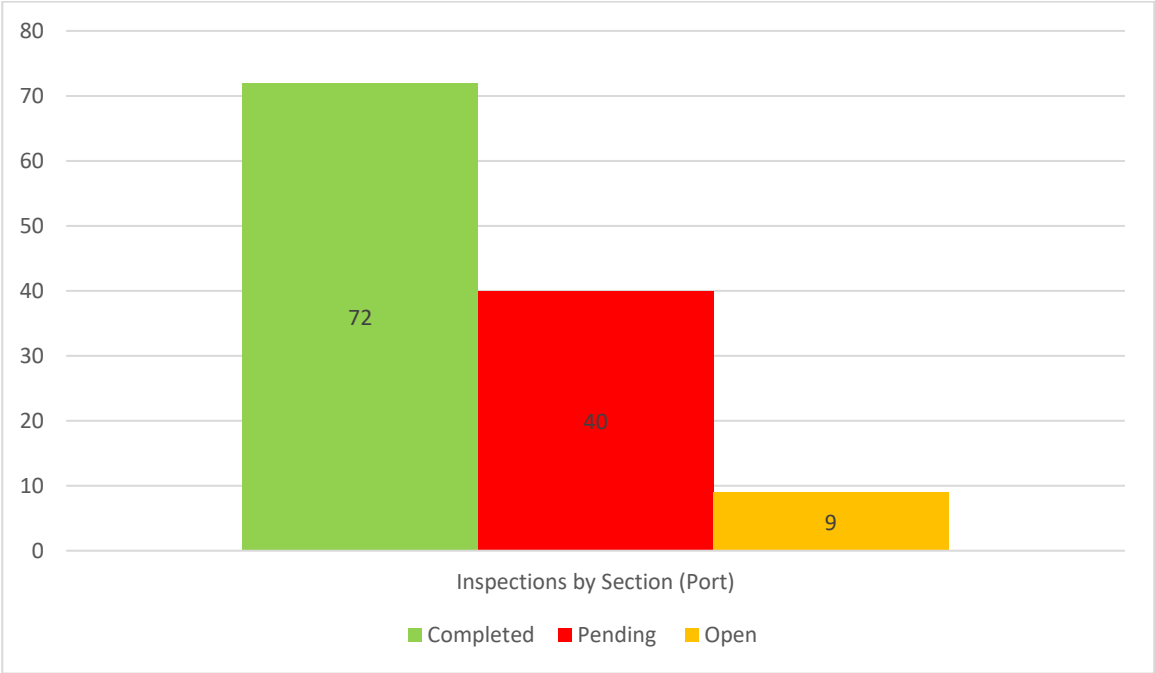

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (Districts Section)



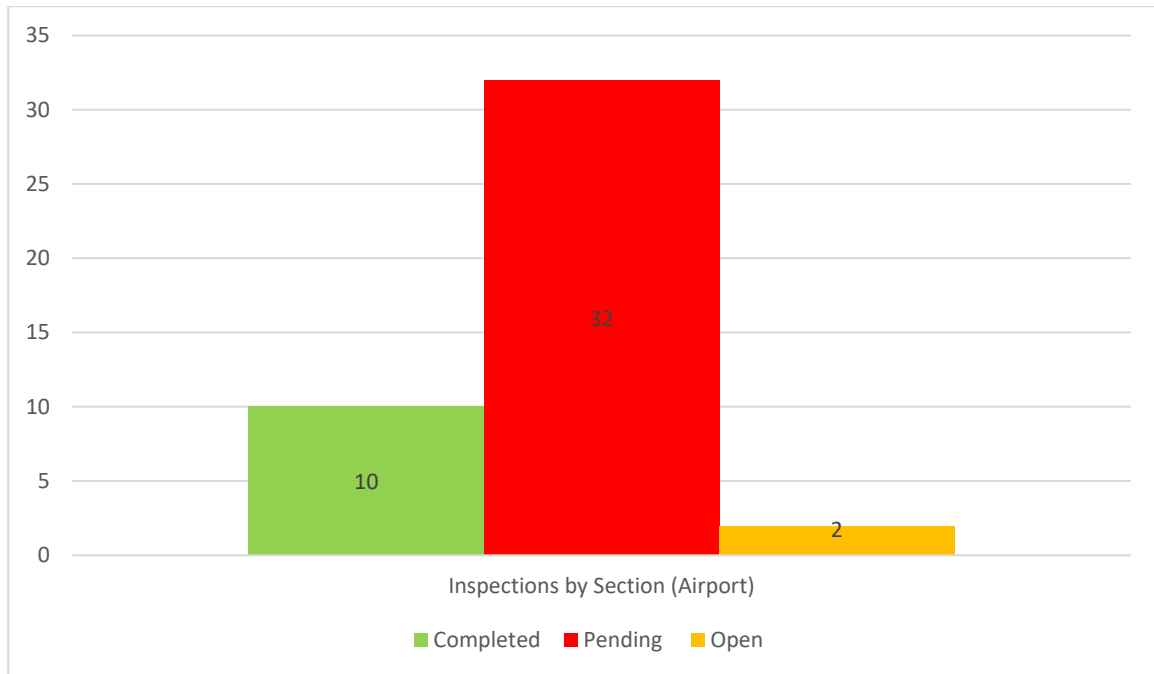

- Hired an H39 for the upcoming 136th academy. Captain Novo will start May 26th to provide 2 weeks of training for the position as the 135th graduates on 6/6. He will also participate in some events prior for preparation.
- Made contact with the Federal Excess program to become the signatory to obtain building materials, vehicles, and resources free of charge.
- FF Stan Lee has completed his project on moving old video of San Francisco fires and incidents to digital form. We now have that available to us for training in the future.
- EMS Training conducted Pre-Tower class for upcoming candidates for the 136th academy.
- EMS training also began the process of conducting a drill with structural collapse and a field amputation with medical staff.
- 443 people were trained by NERT in the month of March

CJAC FUNDS

- With the implementation to drill entry being on the monthly reports and the new weekly drill schedule, we had a record number of hours entered for the month of February at 6150

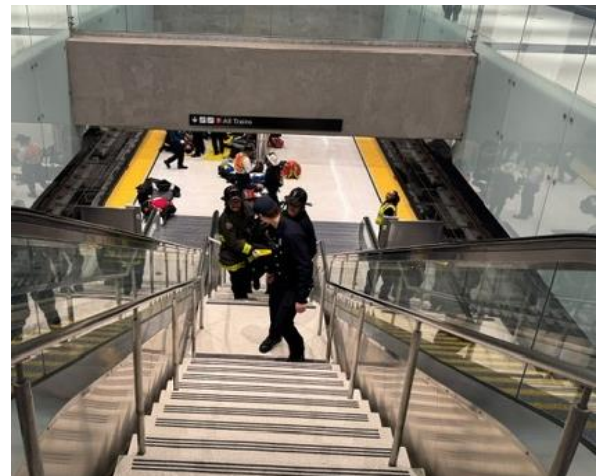
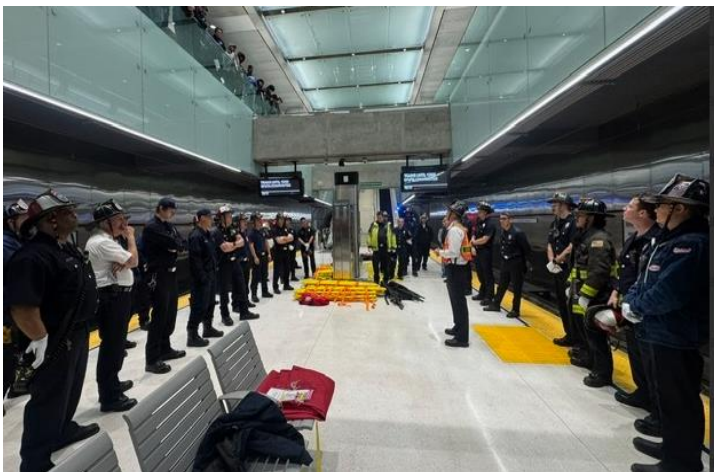

March 2025 Monthly Report

Report

The goal of this month was to bring companies together in their first response areas to pre-plan the most difficult rescues that may happen. Special Operations strongly believes in the “crawl, walk, run” methodology of training our members. We will give our people clear expectations and the supportive training and skills to meet those challenges. Last month, the captains of our rope rescue companies (T14, T19, RS1, & RS2) were given 31 days’ advance notice of specific complex rescues that would take place on a given date. The emergency would be two unconscious patients needing rescues with an extremity impalement to one victim. The companies then coordinated and work together in the weeks ahead in preparation for the target dates. Both evolutions were very successful and I was impressed the teamwork and skill displayed at the drills.

Truck 3 identified their need for elevator rescue training and was partnered with RS1 to sharpen their high angle rope skills in the tower. During the drill, T03 identified equipment needed to accomplish rescues safely such as MPD’s and an additional life-safety rope for their cache. BC McKeon also requested a Rescue Squad & Light Rescue Vehicle Orientation for D3 Chiefs. RS2 and T07 did a thorough job and we may want to continue this format with D2 chiefs in the future.

Special Operations has been involved with making contacts and collaborating with outside agencies- Golden Gate Bridge Authority, California Highway Patrol, Sunnyvale Fire Department, RIVIAN Electric Vehicles, UCSF, and BATEP. We have been working together for safety preplanning and coming together for larger more elaborate drills in the future.

Although I have been busy with special operations events, I have tried to work collaboratively with the other branches of Training: In-service, EMS, and Recruit training. I arranged the Hose Tender details for In-service while Cpt. Draper was on vacation, instructed the 135th recruit academy’s first days of 50’ ladder, cross trained tactical EMS group with emergency evacuation of victims, and assisted EMS with their pre-academy orientation aerial ladder climb.
