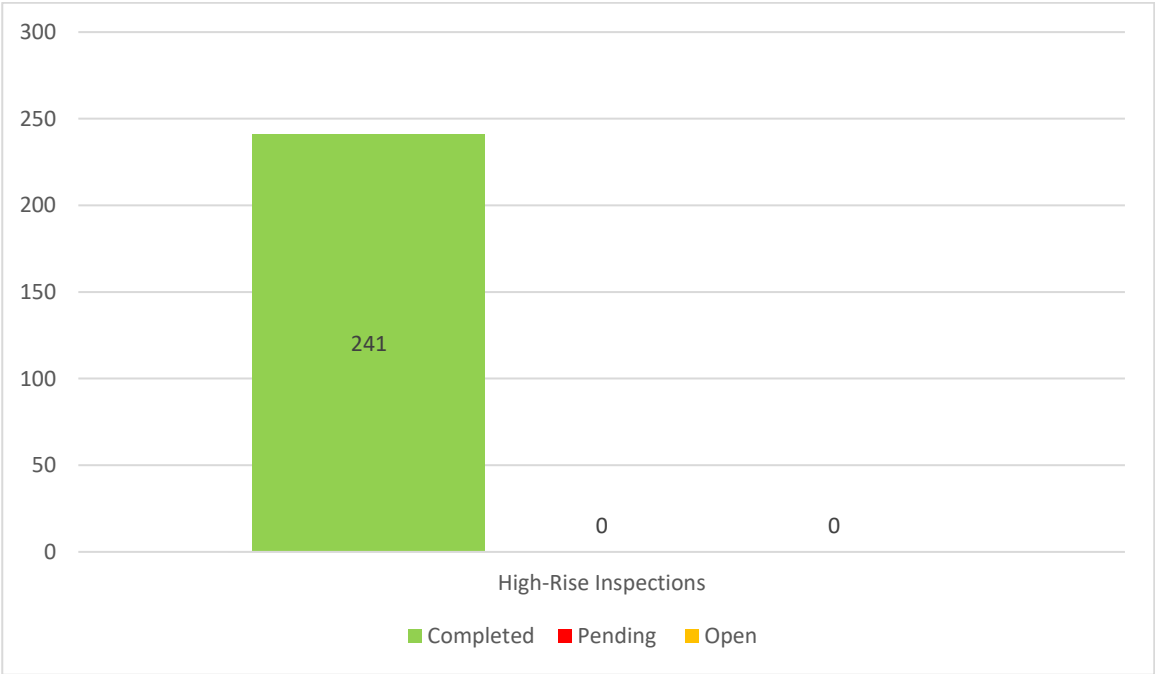

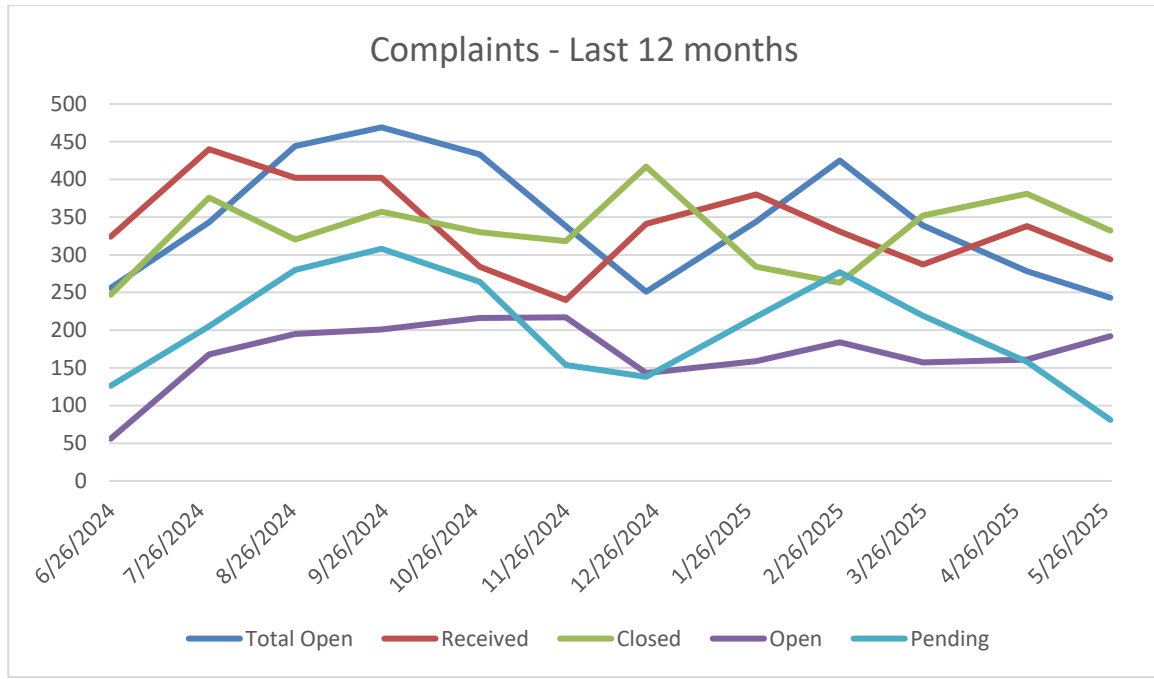

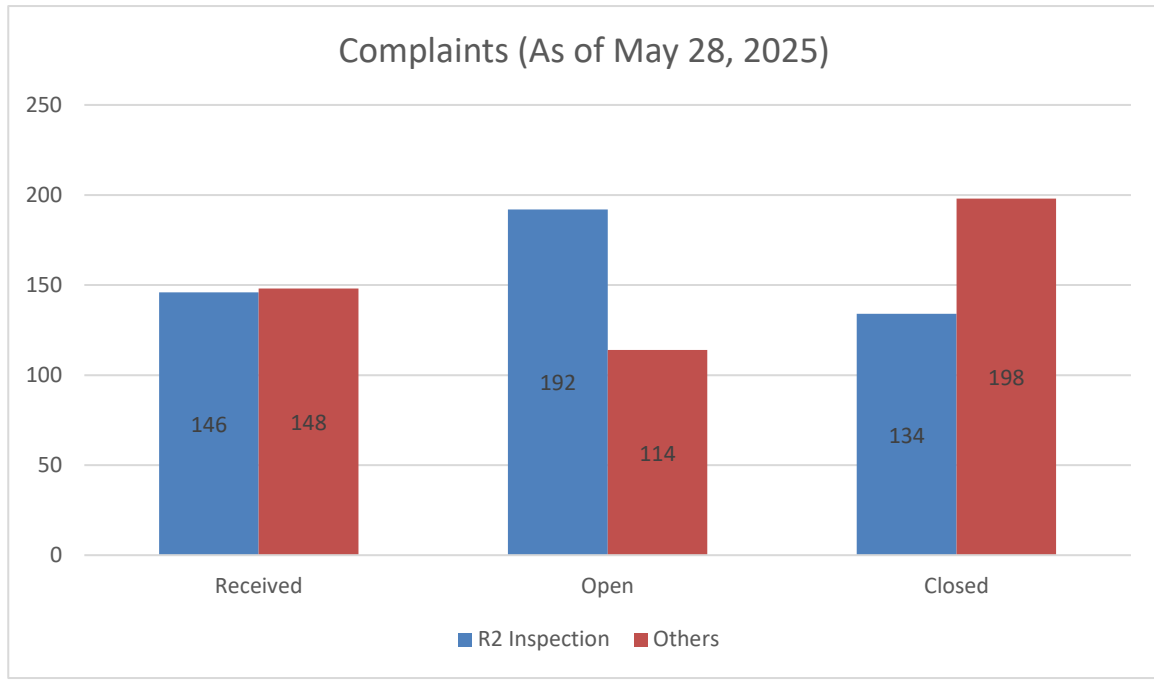

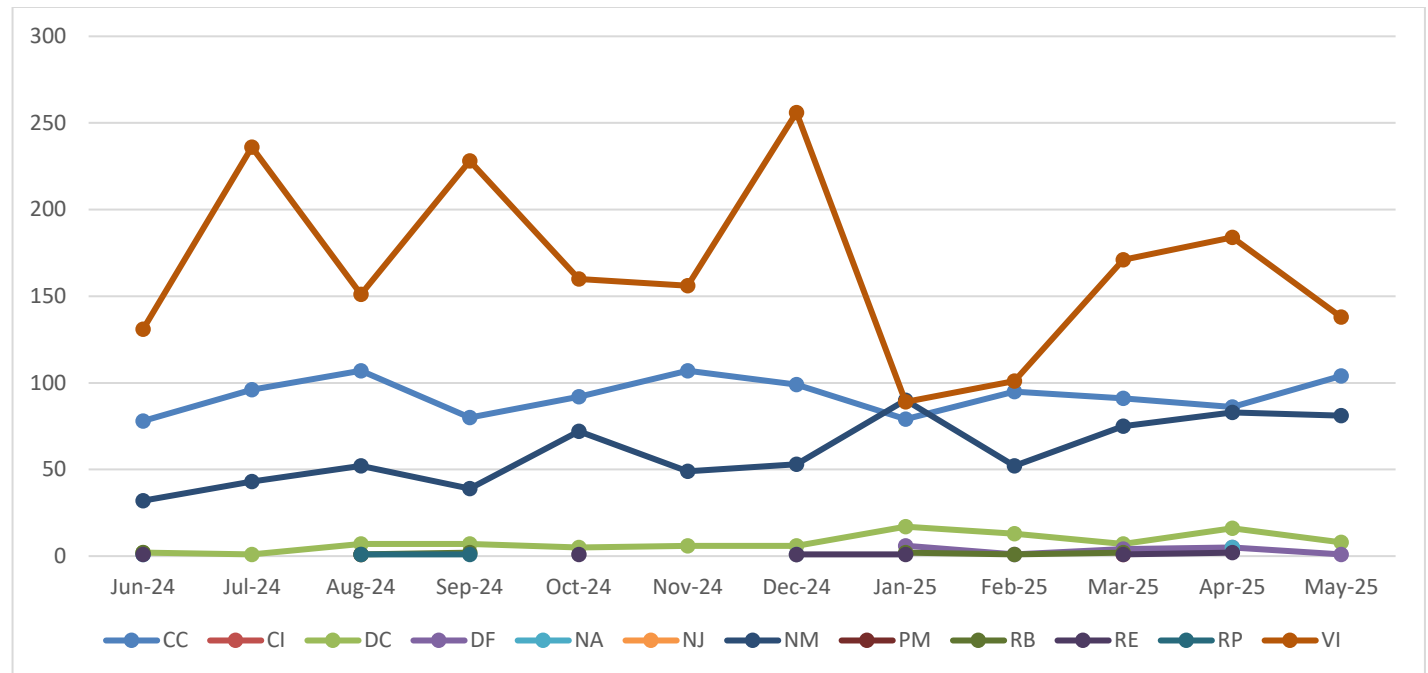

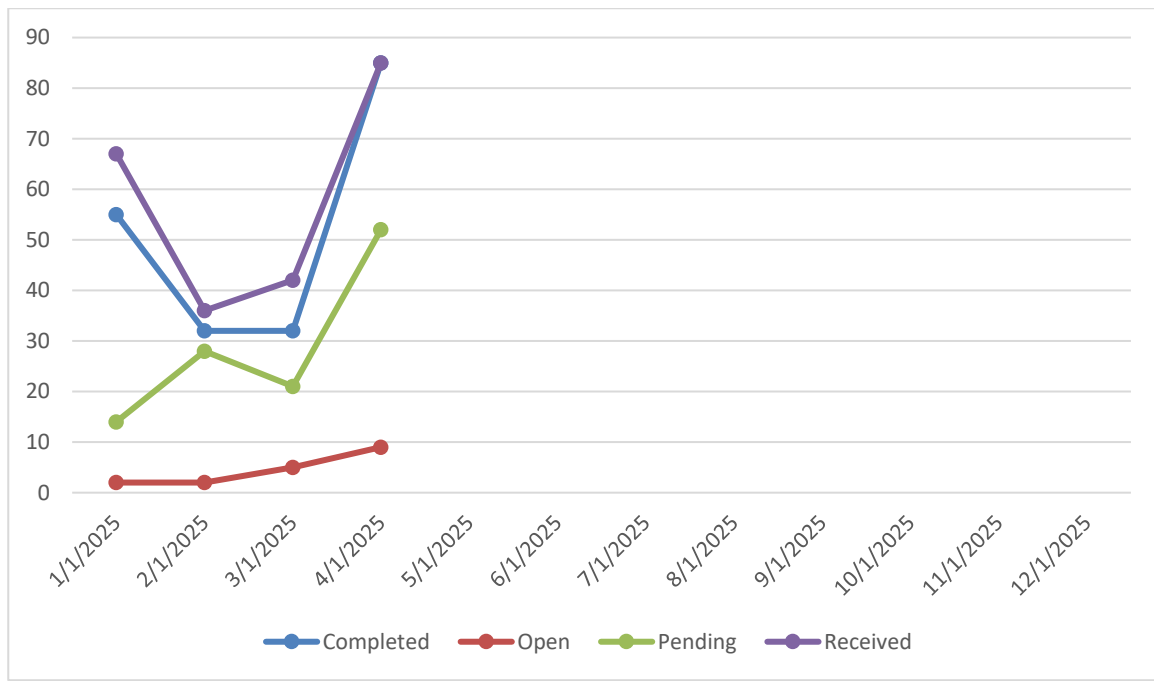

Residential Buildings w/ 9+ units for the last 12 months



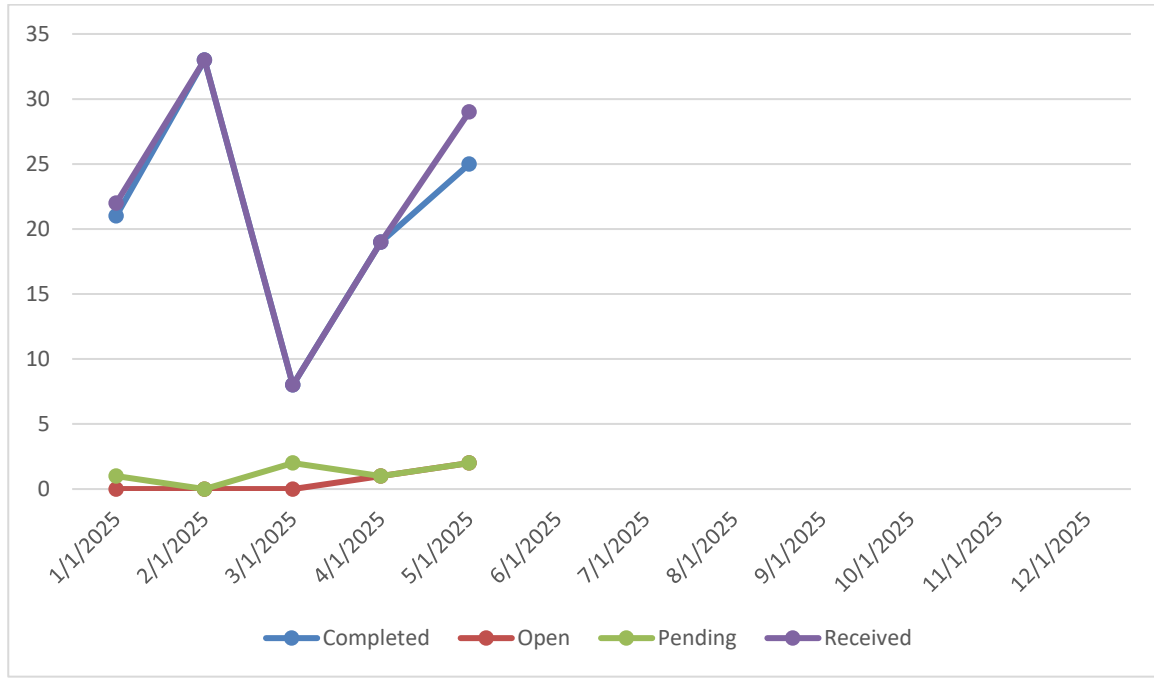

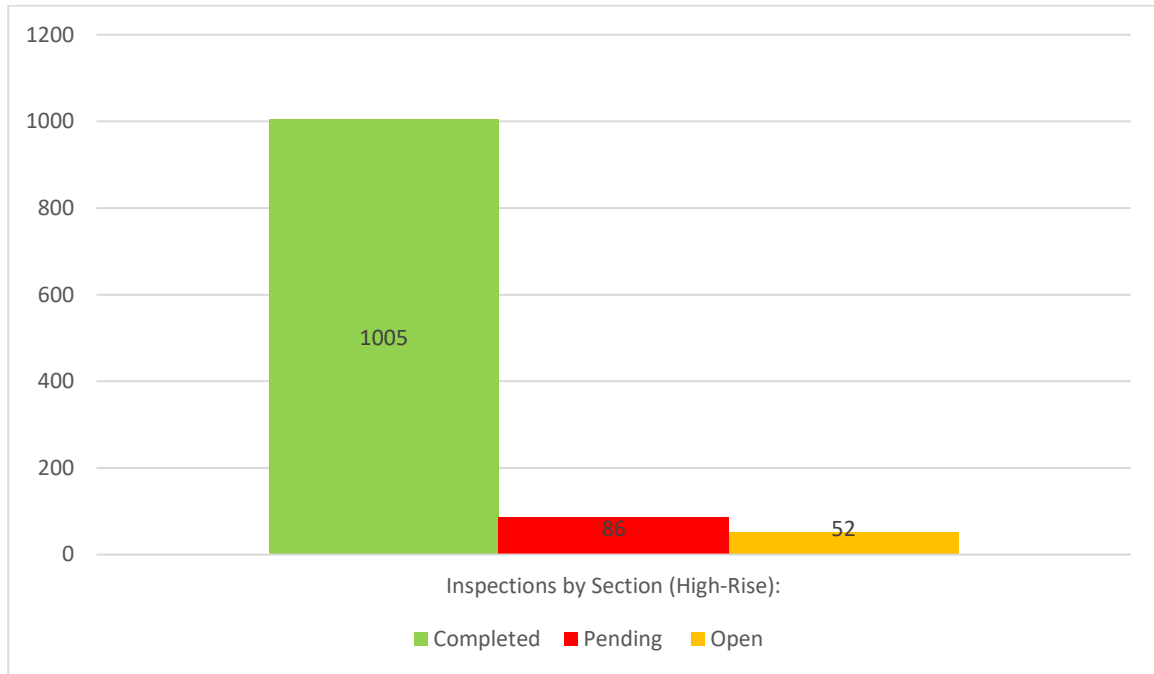

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (Permits Section)



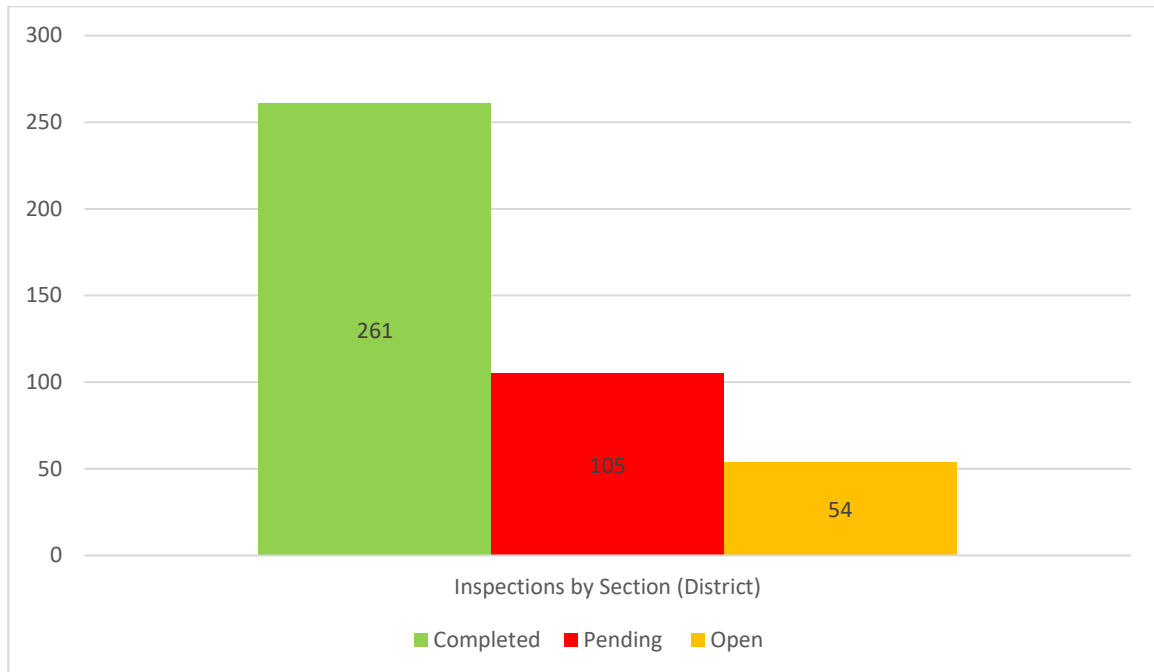

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (High-Rise)



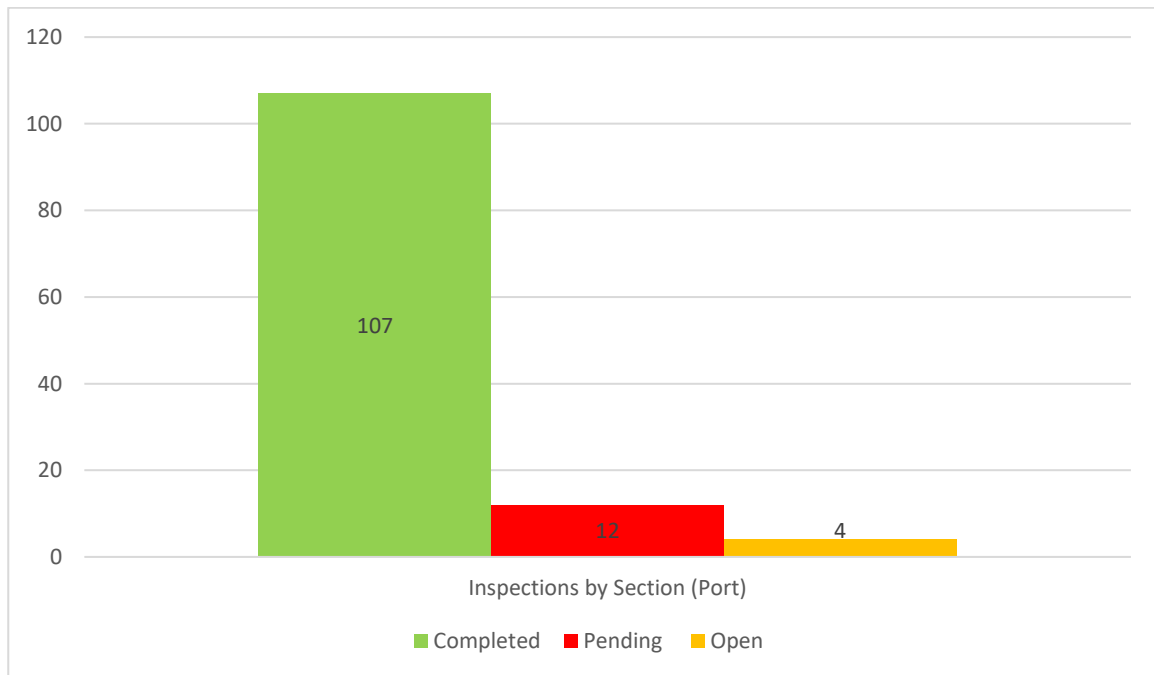

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (Districts Section)



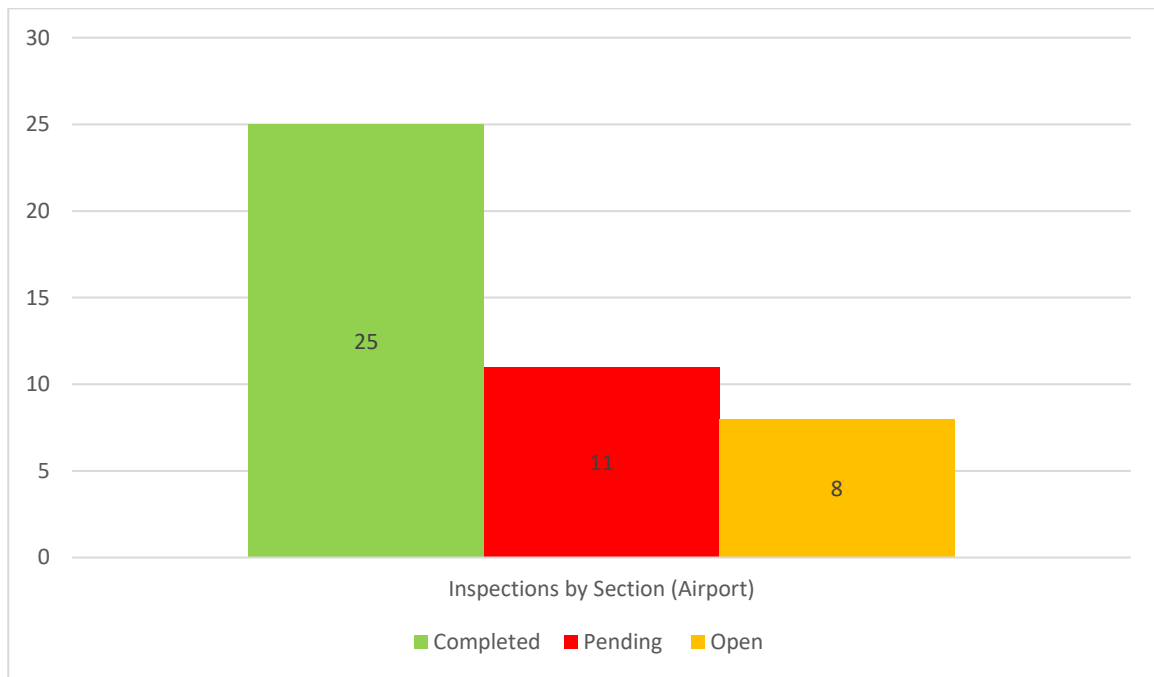

- 5/12 - Attended the Emergency Water Supply drill in Golden Gate Park.
- 5/12 - Attended a virtual meeting with Industrial Hygienist Tony Boone to address OSHA compliance at our training facilities.
- Met with Lt Ryan McEchron from SFPD to utilize their EVOC course at Pier 96 for upcoming Driver Training in June and July for the 133rd class.
- Week of 5/13 - Hosted an Electrical Aspects of Fire Investigation class at Folsom. Several of our members were in attendance
- 5/13, 5/14 - Conducted H16 and H28 interviews to fill positions at Recruit Training after losing several members to promotion and attrition.
- 5/15 - Hosted a disentanglement drill with CHP and GGB authority.
- 5/16 - Met with the command staff and AC's on TEAMS for the Executive Committee in regard to committees and workgroups.
- Attended CCSF fire academy graduation at John Adams campus as a guest speaker to represent SFFD.
- 5/19 - Assisted with logistics at the Officer Academy put on by Baker and Periera.
- 5/20 - Met with Capt. Yuen to go over graduation for the recruits.
- 5/21 - Met with recruit training staff and MIS to discuss tech options for 136th academy testing.
- 5/23 - Attended the 135th academy banquet.
- 5/24 - Participated in the Carnaval celebration in the Mission District.
- 5/27 - Conducted Training Committee meeting at DOT Folsom to discuss a new Training Bulletin for hose pressures.
- 5/28 - Along with EMS training Cadre, met with representatives for virtual reality EMS training where a Demo was presented.
- 5/29 - Participated in picking members for the 136th academy with the command staff at HQ.
- 5/30 - We received concrete dumpster and trash dumpster at DOT Folsom to clean up the drill yard. Concrete was loaded by the DOT and trash will be loaded throughout the week to dispose of unneeded materials.



Additional Activities and Projects:

- Continue to support B4 to complete open task-book for Station 16 members to complete their Large Vessel Boat Operator course. The Large Vessel Boat Operator class starts on 6/2 with 8 members from Station 16. With the completion of their task-books, we should be fully operational 365 days a year.
- Captain Novo has been participating in the 135th Academy to prepare himself to take over for Captain Yuen for the 136th Academy that will start July 28, 2025.
- 12 members were selected to be 136th academy instructors. These instructors will start on 6/9 for crossover with current instructors. They will also be tasked with adjustments to the recruit handbook, enhancements to the syllabus, and assisting with 133rd Driver Training.
- I am working with SFPD to use the EVOC course at Pier 96 for the upcoming Driver Training Class for members getting off probation from the 133rd class. These classes will start on 6/23. It will be a 3 day course that will consist of lecture, apparatus placement, Code 3 Operation, and Truck/Engine city driving. SFPD will provide their EVOC staff to have several vehicles that provide “active intersection control training.”
- In Service training conducted several Flat Roof Operation drills at Treasure Island. This was utilizing the vacant building at 258 Avenue H in coordination with TIDA. Several companies came out and cut ventilation holes in the existing complex roof. This drill included apparatus placement, vertical ventilation, laddering, and roof operations.
- The forcible entry class has been scheduled at TITF June 16,17 and 18. These are 3 one day sessions with 8 hours of instruction each. We have room for 40 members each day. These classes filled very quickly after the class posting.
- The DOT is working with suppression members to put on an all-day vehicle extrication class in the October time frame. We are hoping this will be three 1-day classes to capture many of our members. This class will be taught by our own members.
- The DOT will be starting a “Podcast” in August-September that will memorialize information from our members in regard to fires, rescues, and just general experiences. This podcast will be put on our online training which will generate CJAC revenue for future training. It will later be put on our training website (sffdttraining.org) to be accessed anytime for future members.
- In-Service staff is currently hosting RIC (Rapid Intervention Crew) module at TITF. This will be rescuing downed firefighters under certain conditions. The module will also have a command component and an EMS component. The EMS component will allow our EMS personnel to “bridge the gap” with suppression personnel in a training setting. Community Paramedicine members have been attending and participating in forcible Entry with Halligan and Flat Head Axe.
- EMS Training is currently instructing H3 L-1 academy.
- Special Operations conducted several drills including breaching and breaking, Rope Rescue, and Firefighter Survival. The Firefighter Survival has been hosted in the afternoons at DOT Folsom utilizing our firefighter survival trailer prop.
- I am collaborating with WAYMO to give our members training on the WAYMO Operations. This is projected in August. We will utilize low traffic areas of Treasure Island to create a fire scene where a WAYMO will be summoned by their company reps. A programmer will input the scenario into their system to prevent vehicles from erratic behavior should this happen in a real scenario.

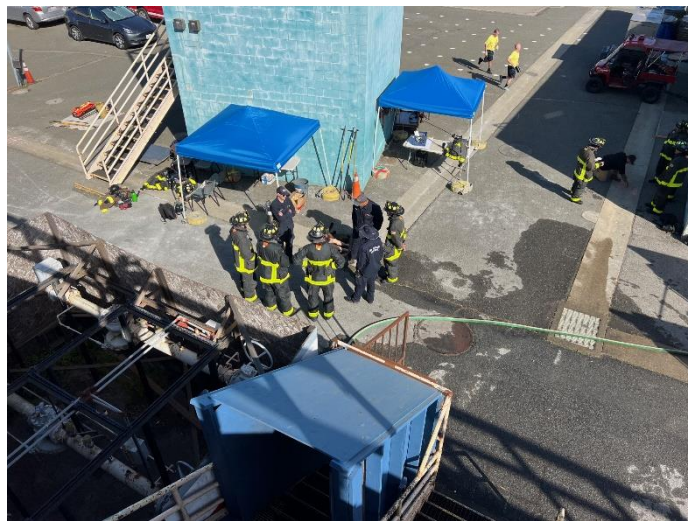

May 2025 Monthly Report

May was another month filled with training for high risk, low frequency emergencies. In collaboration with SF General Hospital Surgical Unit, DOT hosted the first ever (that I know of) “Field Amputation in a Building Collapse environment.” We simulated a building collapse at Treasure Island Training Facility and had our units respond accordingly as in the real emergency. E48 made patient contact, Truck 48 assisted with shoring and manpower, and Rescue Squad 1 assembled a rope rescue high point to lower and access the crushed/buried victim. One of our H3 FF/PM was lowered into the collapse zone to initiate “crush syndrome” protocols under the direction of a Rescue Captain. A field surgeon was then lowered to the patient’s side via the rope system to amputate and free the crushed limb. To add to the realism, actual lamb legs were used so that the surgeons could practice the amputation on real flesh. I believe the drill was an overall success for all those who participated.

Beginning with week 2 through the end of the month, we continued with the theme of collapse rescue as Truck companies practice concrete cutting and breaching skills. A total of 12 trucks, 2 engines, both light rescue vehicles and a rescue squad demonstrated their breaching and cutting skills with power tools, hand tools, and everything on the truck. I can only characterize this evolution as “difficult, dirty, and hard work.” Crews worked to simulate making a hole through a rebar reinforced concrete slab to free victims trapped on the other side. Truck companies were able to get hands on experience with the cordless hydraulic concrete crusher and test its capacities as a rescue tool. All SFFD ladder trucks were given this Genesis made tool, but most have not been able to get hands-on practice. In addition to renewing our concrete rescue skills, the best part was observing companies work together as a team and the sense of pride shared after the task was completed.

On 5/28, we started Firefighter Survival and RIT training in the afternoon sessions at the DOT. The IAFF Rescue Trailer has been stabilized and set up for active drills. The practice course consists of metal cutting forcible entry stations, SCBA profile changes, victim rescues and carries, critical communication practice (MAYDAY & emergency traffic), and an Emergency Breathing Supply System review. The drill was challenging for both the new recruit and the seasoned veteran. We started with ground school to teach the techniques bailing out to a ladder and/or using a rope to assist with escape from upper floors. The response from the firefighters has been very positive and improvements have been made for the next round of training.

Special Operations continues to make contacts and collaborating with outside agencies specifically Golden Gate Bridge Authority and California Highway Patrol. We have been working together for safety preplanning and coming together for larger more elaborate drills. On 5/15, SFFD hosted our partners in another collaborative joint training on Treasure Island- Disentanglement and Civil

Disturbance Tactics. Over 60 CHP, Iron workers, and SFFD members practiced techniques for removing parked cars, disruptive protesters, extricating barrier devices, and sharing available resources.

Last, Special operations assisted the 135th Recruit class with Fire Control 3B at multiple stations (fire attack, search, and ignition/safety positions). I have also cross trained In-service staff for the Rescue Drags and Carries portion of RIT module taking place in the mornings at TITF.

For the month of June, I plan to continue and expand the Firefighter Survival training in the afternoons while facilitating training and dive evolutions with the Rescue Squads in the mornings.

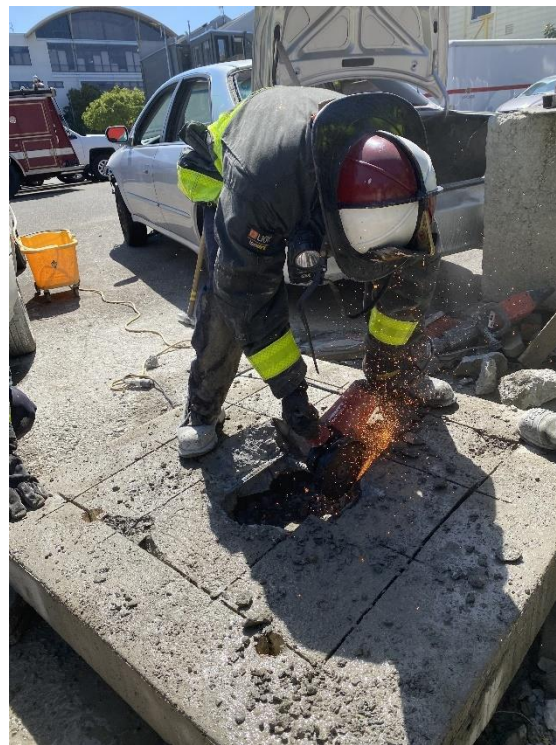

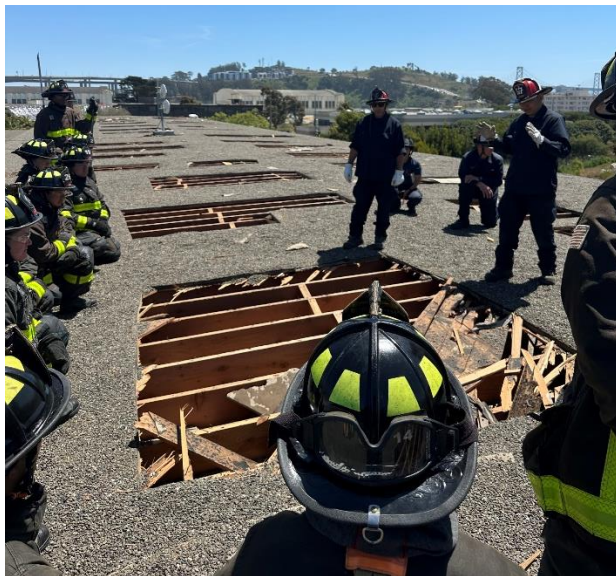
