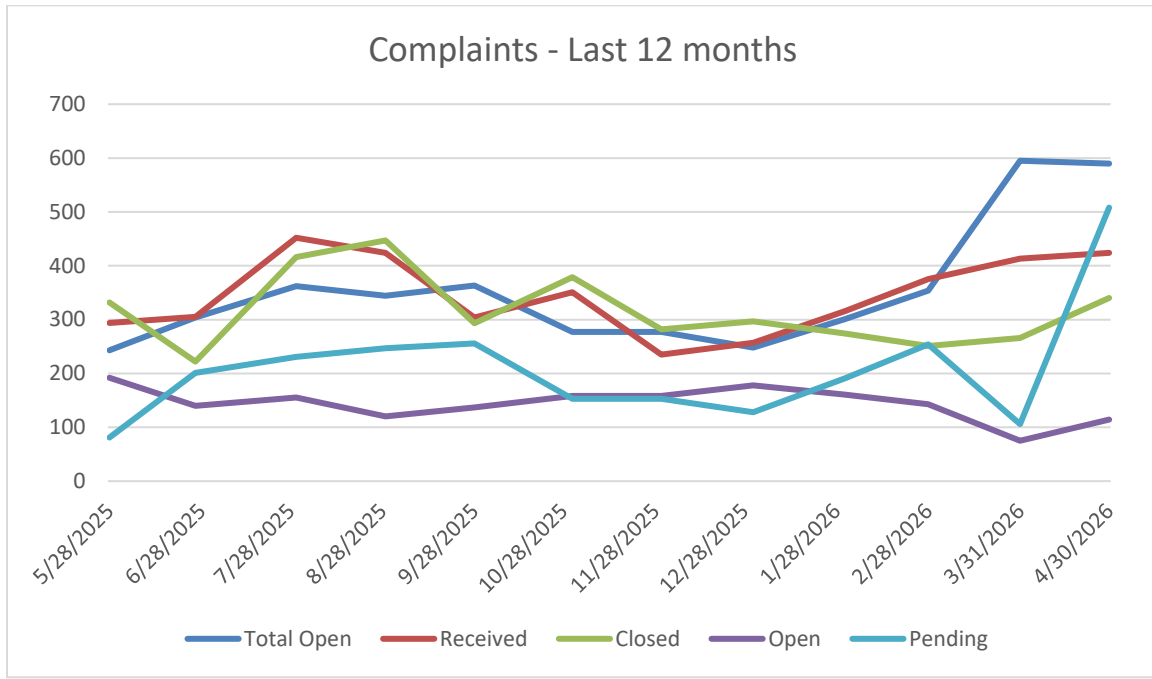

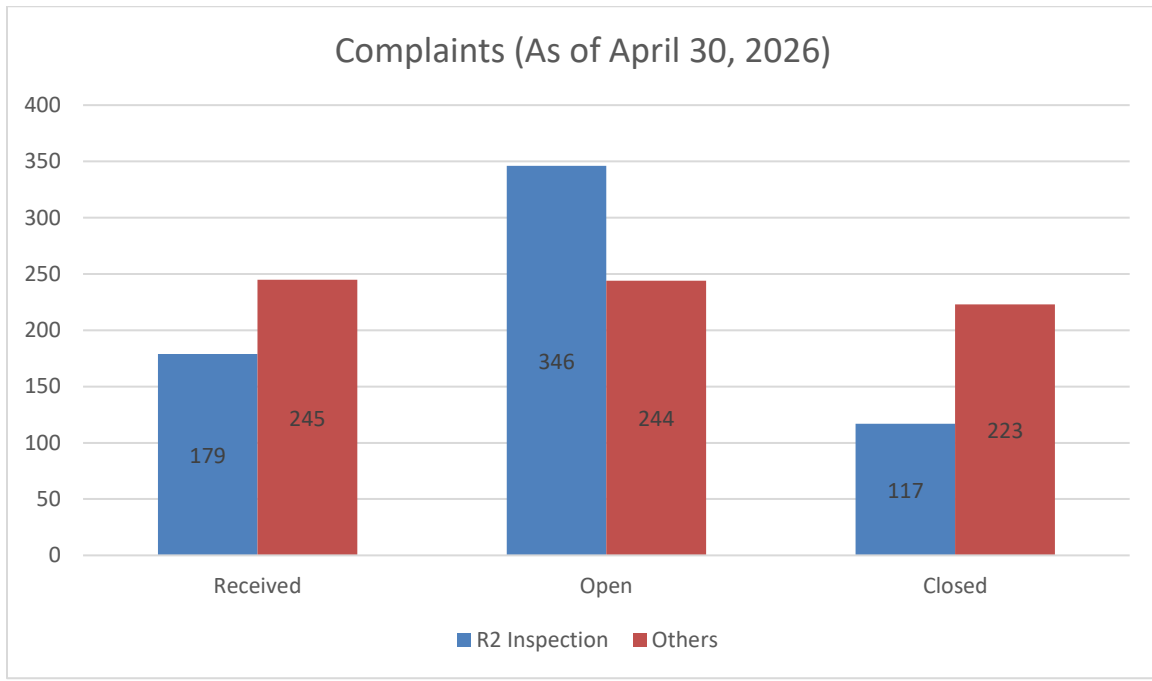

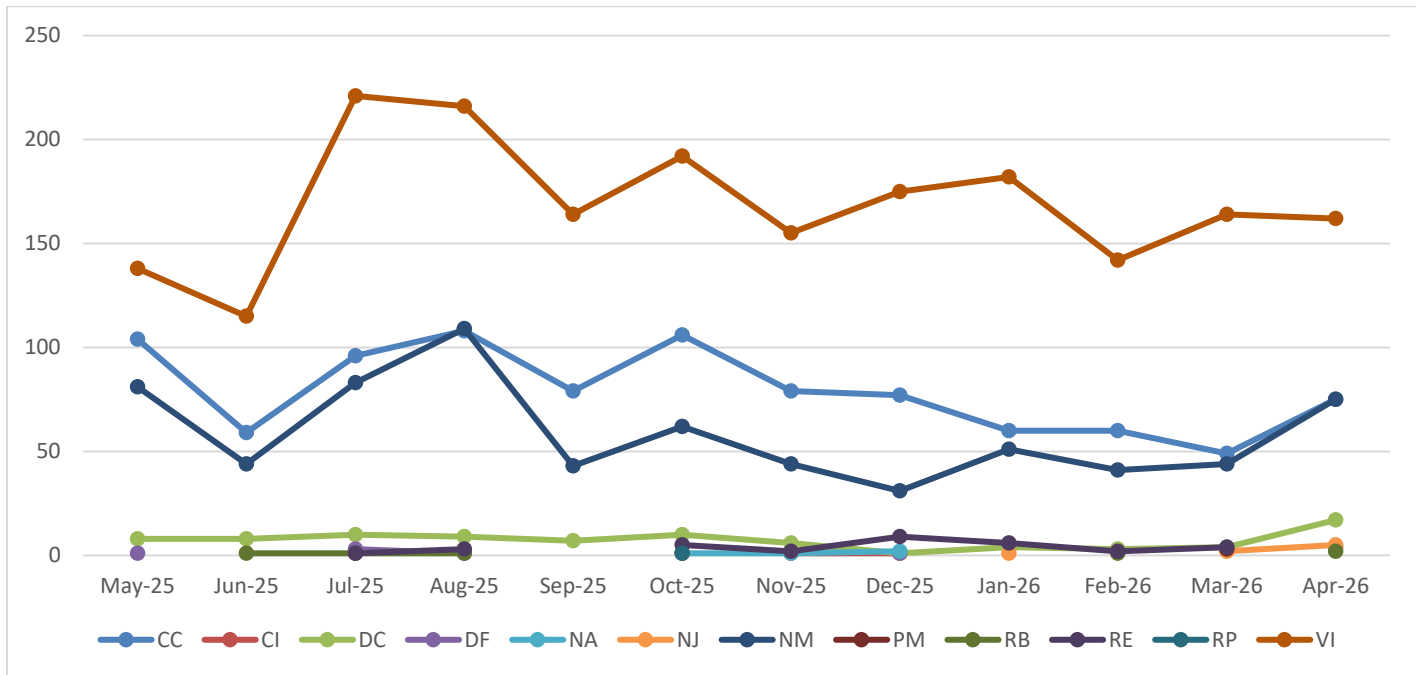

Residential Buildings w/ 9+ units for last 12 months



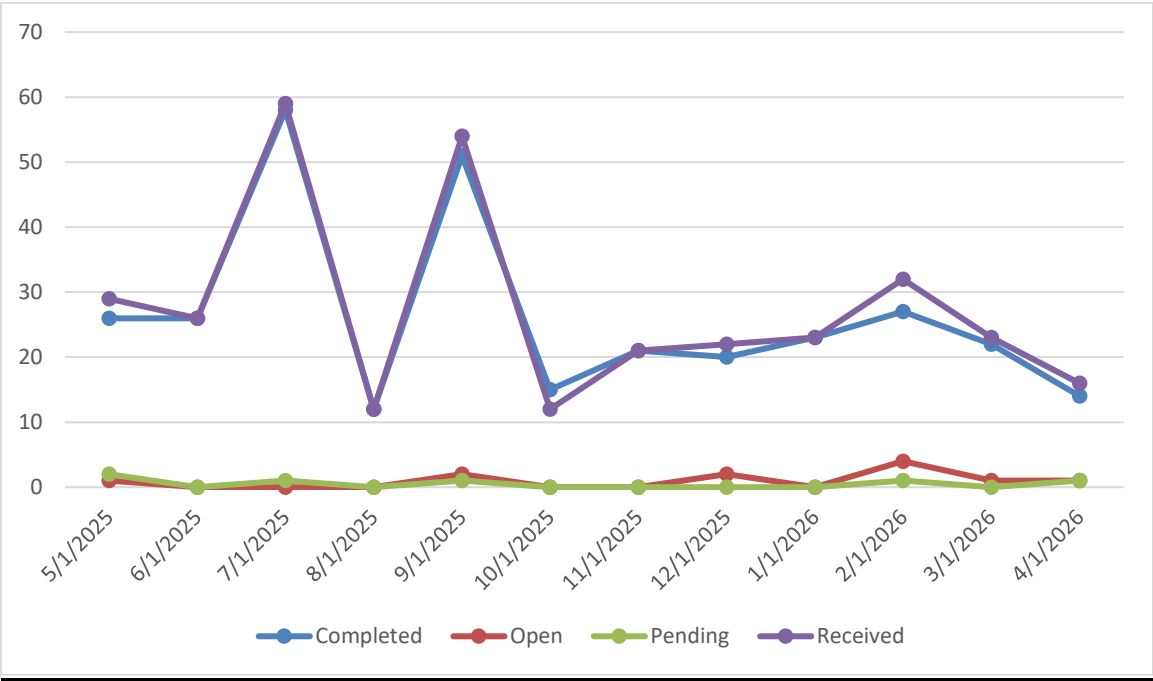

The BFI Captain is the designated Custodian of Records for all SFFD National Fire Incident Reports (NFIRS) and Fire Investigation Reports (FIR). The BFI receives and processes all Public Records requests for these reports and also contacts SFFD for court ordered subpoenas.

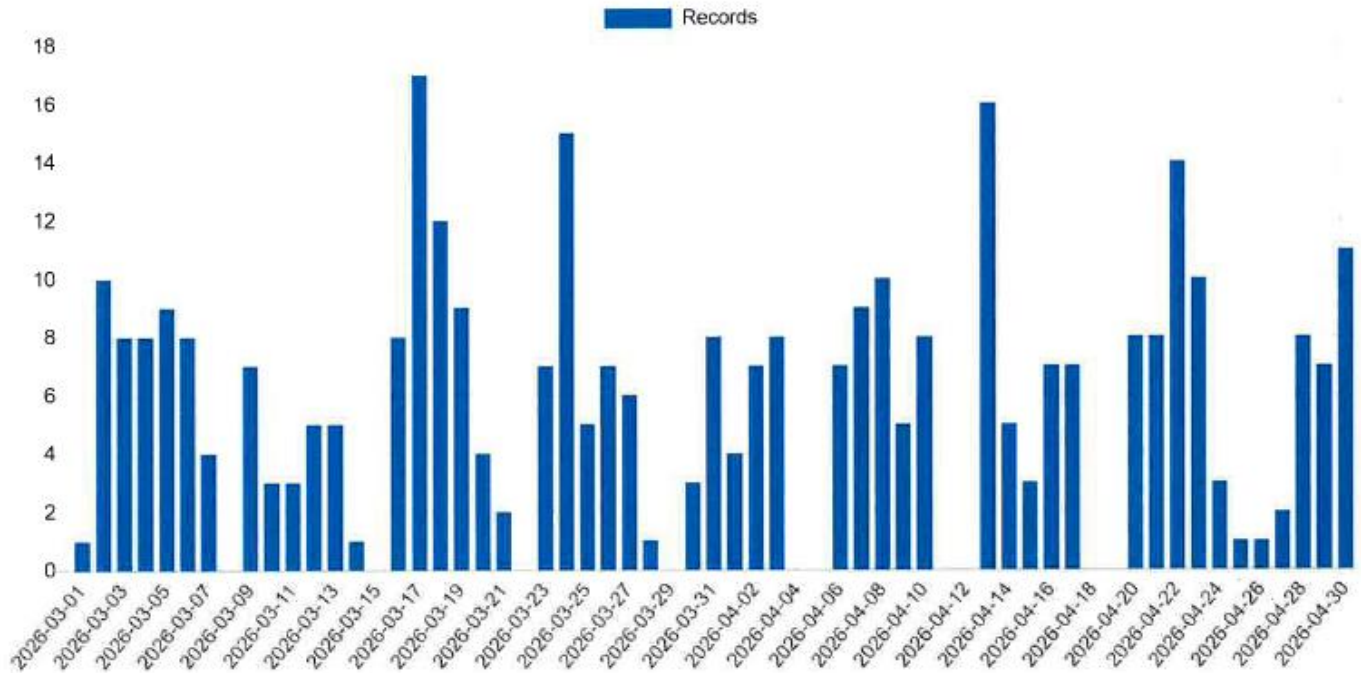

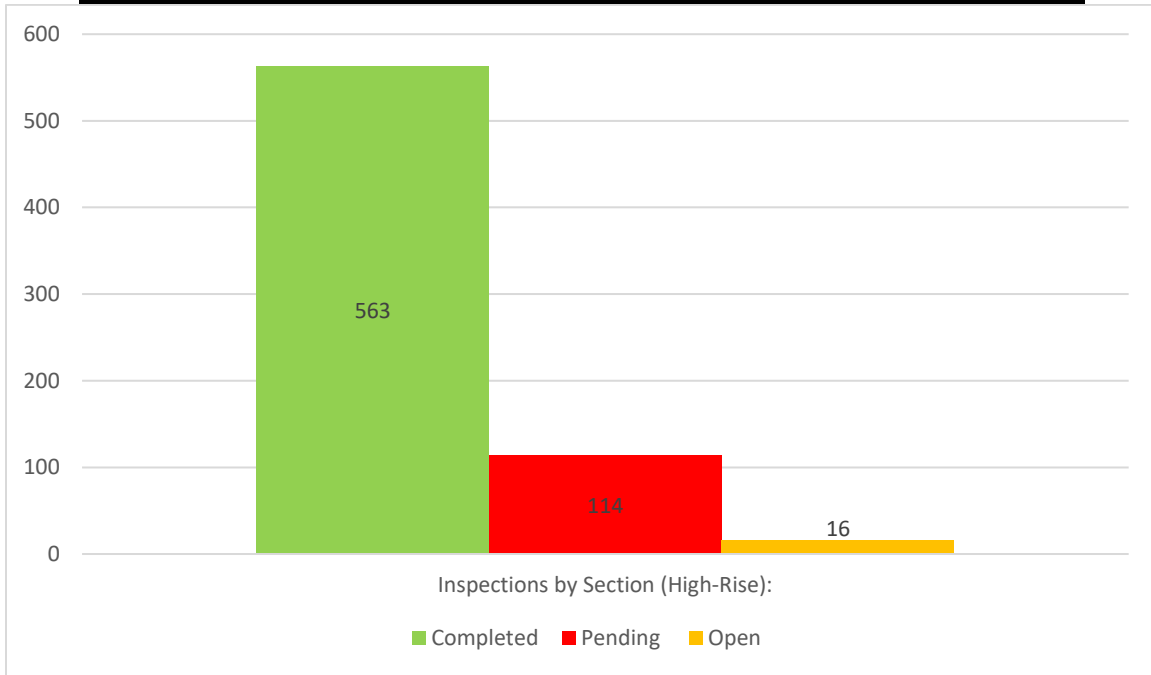

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (Permits Section)



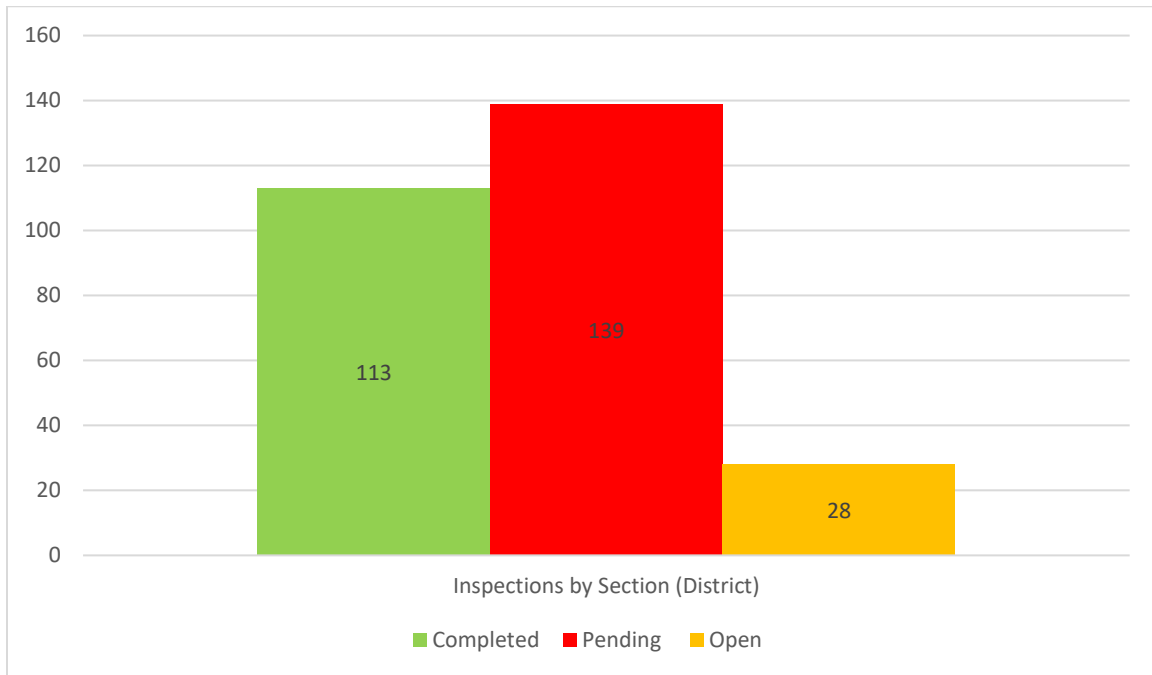

Permit Annual Inspections by Section (High-Rise)



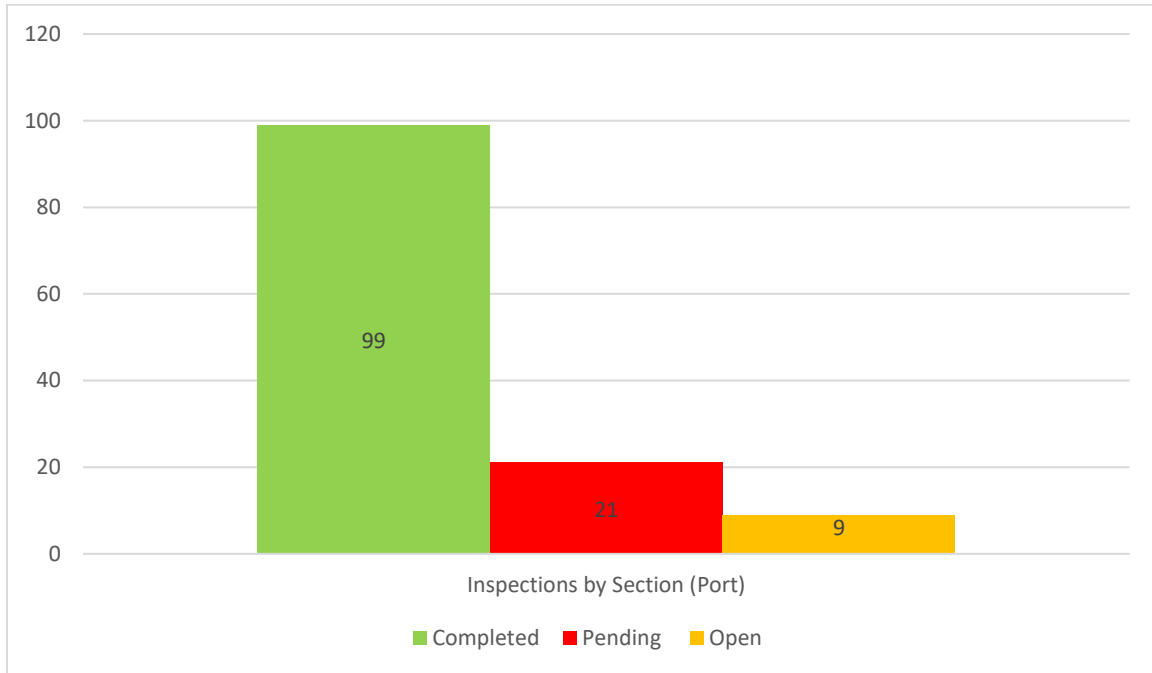

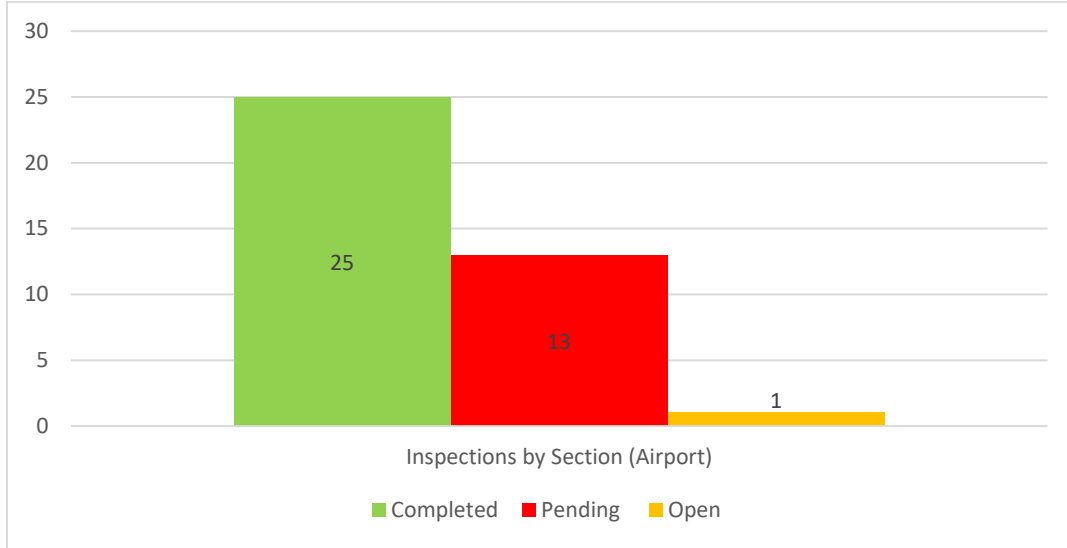

Activities and Projects

- The 137th Academy is in full swing. The testing has been completed, and the remainder of the training will prepare them for field operations. The class is doing fantastic. They will receive Rope Rescue Awareness and Operations for the first time in SFFD Academy history. This will open the doors for further rescue training inter career and will also prepare them for Special Operations and Disaster Preparedness.
- Special Ops is conducting several drills throughout the city. Currently, they are having Confined Space and RIC drills with collaboration from the Presidio. This has been a great collaboration and the RIC Drills at Battery Dynamite were very well received from the field crews.
- The DOT is moving forward with developing a Rope Rescue Awareness and Operations Cadre. We are continuing to task book our instructors and the DOT has partnered with the

Airport Division to utilize their RRAO classes to develop more instructors. The DOT has had several classes and will be having another in May with 24 students.

- We are continuing to work with City College to develop a course for our members to be enrolled in their entire career. This will generate \$3.50 per hour of training and should bring in funds over 1 million dollars per year for training. This is in the infancy stage, but City College is fully invested in this program.
- H16 Neal Narayan has been creating training videos, podcasts, and rebuilding our Vector Solutions online training. These videos generate CJAC funds from our members. We will continue to publish monthly podcasts focused on training.
- The DOT is hosting several classes utilizing our own experienced members and using CJAC Funds to support this. This includes RRAO, an Engine Academy, Fire Investigation 1B, an upcoming Public Safety Diver class this summer, additional Rope Rescue classes, Instructor 1 and 2, and Forcible Entry classes that were well attended by members from the field and the Fire Reserves. This was an excellent opportunity for the Reserves to work along our Full Time Members.
- In-Service staff are currently taking training to the field and visiting stations to conduct training.
- In Service Training has had multiple live burns. We have expanded adding two more Connex boxes to simulate below grade operations. This expansion is almost complete.
- The DOT hosted several Tablet Command Classes taught by retired AC Dave Franklin.
- We have several classes in collaboration with the Airport Division. This includes ICS 300 and Confined Space. This has been a great opportunity to establish a culture of unity among our SFFD Divisions.
- The DOT and the field have continued to increase their support for the Fire Reserves. We are detailing companies to assist them on Thursday Training nights. Several officers have volunteered to assist with this. We have obtained equipment for them and are searching for a dedicated legacy apparatus to give to them for training and company pride. The Recruit Staff has worked hard to bring a “Academy Culture” with discipline and organization to our program, while maintaining respect for the great work they give to us at our Greater Alarms and events. This framework will prepare them to be successful if they choose to become full time members of SFFD.
- The DOT will be hosting the first ever “Land Based Marine Firefighting” class in June. This will prepare us for Shipboard firefighting as it is such a Low Frequency- High Risk event. This will be funded by State OES taught by the Industry Leaders and specially developed for SFFD resources and Operations
- DOT Folsom Ventilation Training Props have been reimagined and enhanced to bring more options and efficiency. We are currently making a video to inform the field of the changes. Special thanks to the members of Station 7 for their assistance and ingenuity.
- I am currently working with BC Alba to start a fitness program for our field members. This will bring in many CJAC hours. Several members in the field have offered assistance to make monthly fitness programs specialized for firefighting and EMS operation in collaboration with the Physician’s Office.

The continuation of Auto Extrication 101 training for truck companies restarted after a brief pause as attention shifted to our newest members of the 137th recruit class. DOT staff lead an introductory extrication clinic including peel and peak, basic safety, how to prepare a scene, stabilization and usage of the powered spreaders and cutters. It is our hope that the newest members can fill the needs of these dynamic emergencies on their first days in the firehouse.

Battalion chiefs were brought down to the tower with an engine and a truck for a mass search drill under zero visibility heavily smoked out conditions. Companies practiced vital communications and implemented a newer tactic of a casualty collection point to streamline the rescue. Up to 12 victims were rescued from each below grade scenario and challenged even the most experienced crews.

In recognition of the April 18th Anniversary of 1906 Earthquake, Truck companies were called down to practice the art of breaking and breaching concrete. T09, T11, and T17 used concrete cutting rotary saws, jack hammers, and the portable crusher carried on trucks to cut a hole to free a victim. If it again happens this year, we will be ready.

Station 29 rotated all their crews through the portable mass decontamination tent stored at their station. In the event of a major disaster, it surely will be deployed to save lives. This tent is designed to clean and process up to hundreds of contaminated victims and comes in a portable package easily put into service by a single engine company.

For rope rescue, we continue to work with the Golden Gate Bridge Authority and Southern Marin Fire practicing for suicide net jumper scenarios. We conducted 3 ground school practice days with Station 14 and Rescue Squad 1 at a realistic prop. There will be 2 weekends in May where we will test our skills mid-span under real conditions of wind, over the bay, and in view of bridge traffic.

On the southern side of the city, Station 19 demonstrated their rope proficiencies with a crashed hang glider scenario with an impalement. For 3 consecutive days, Station 19 and B08/B09 set up a rescue basket to stabilize, extricate, package and lift a rescue mannequin back up the sand cliffs of Fort Funston. Crews utilized their recently approved CMC Clutch and CMC Capto rope hardware to make the rescue.

Rescue Squad 2 conducted 3 days of dive rescue drills at the Warming Hutt in Crissy Fields. Each day, crews deployed a new Last Seen Point (LSP) marker buoy to narrow the search area. The rescue diver then proceeds to the spot directed by a tender. A secondary back up diver is on hand to provide assistance if needed. Crews also employed the AquaEye sonar victim detector to help narrow the search.

Special Operations finished April with 4 days of Rapid Intervention Crew training at the Presidio's Battery Dynamite bunker. Each company got the chance to soften the building by plunge cutting metal bars, break chains, squeeze through confined spaces, negotiate ladders in full darkness, sound floors, swim through wire fields, and finally rescue a downed firefighter by dragging and establishing the air sharing method of EBSS. In the four days, we covered 24 engine companies from all parts of the city and learned valuable lessons for what it takes to rescue our own. RIC ALWAYS NEEDS TO BE READY.

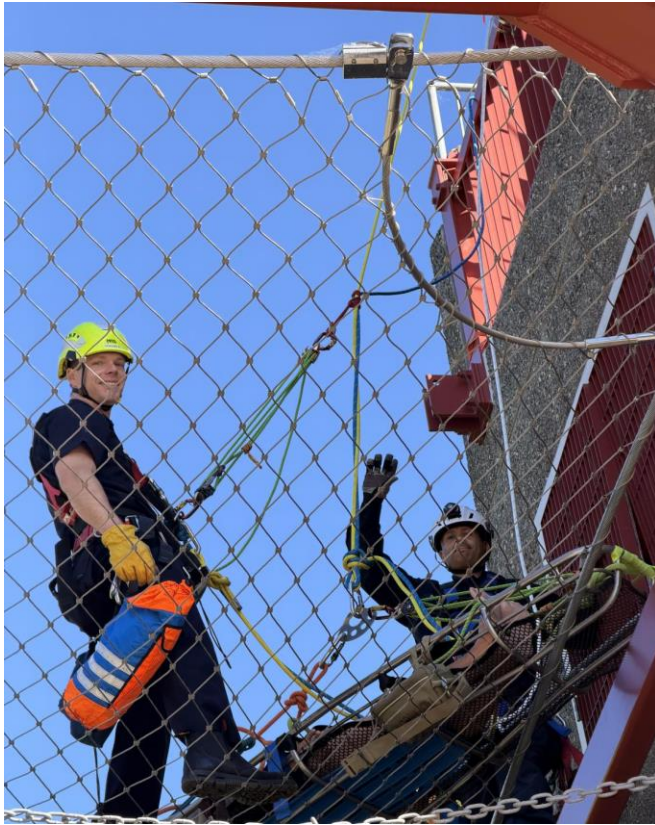

Report

March - April, Division of training, in service at treasure island.

Basement fire prop is nearly complete; in-service created two separate burn rooms for the basement prop. The design for the search rooms is complete and being built with an estimated completion time of mid-May. Burn box #1 is now complete hallways and rooms added for more realistic training are complete.

In service field training at the firehouses has been going very well. Inservice is continuing to concentrate on the daily drill schedule. Instructor Jesson has been working on Pump theory and practice with the drivers during down time between emergency communication and firefighter turn out removal. We are running burn room #2 once a week bringing one engine and one truck for first in ops. In service spent spare time cleaning and getting ready for the new academy class. We worked with the water department to put shut offs on the fire hydrant feeders for safety. PG&E had a disaster drill on the ground of TITF with an auto extrication component downed power line prop and live burns. Golden Gate Bridge authority came and went through the burn room and also trained on auto extrication and electric vehicle fires, SFPD was involved in some burn room, SCBA and safety training, all training was conducted and supported by In-service training.

Meetings and Planning

3/1 FF Jesson continued in service training at the firehouses. March's in-service drill was emergency communications, April's in-service drill the end of comms and the beginning of emergency turn out removal which will proceed through May.

4/25 After all the repairs were complete on the SkyTrak it was decided to return it to the government excess program.

3/25 – 4/30 In-service work with Chief Leal and his cadre to set up and engage the first ever engine academy. Props were built that will remain in place for future academies.

Training

In service training has been sending training to the field, Buddy Breathing, Emergency Communications, Engine pump theory, and downed firefighter turn out removal. In-service also installed lighting and cold patch for safety on the training grounds.

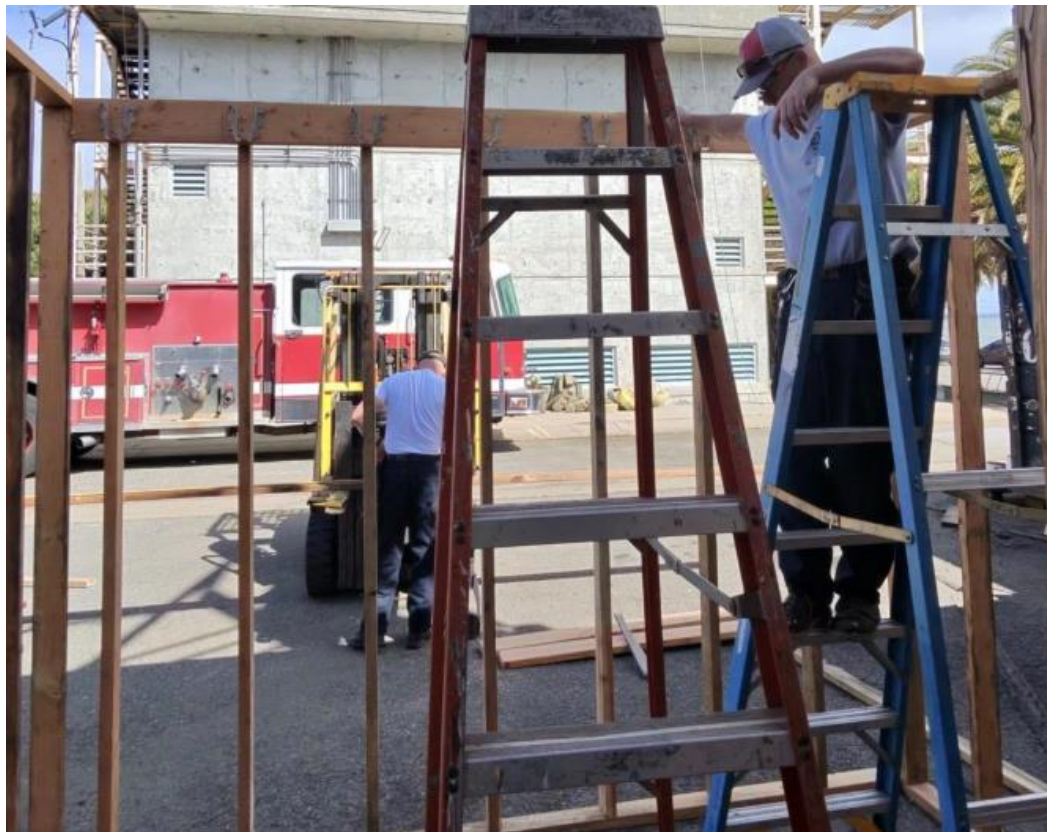

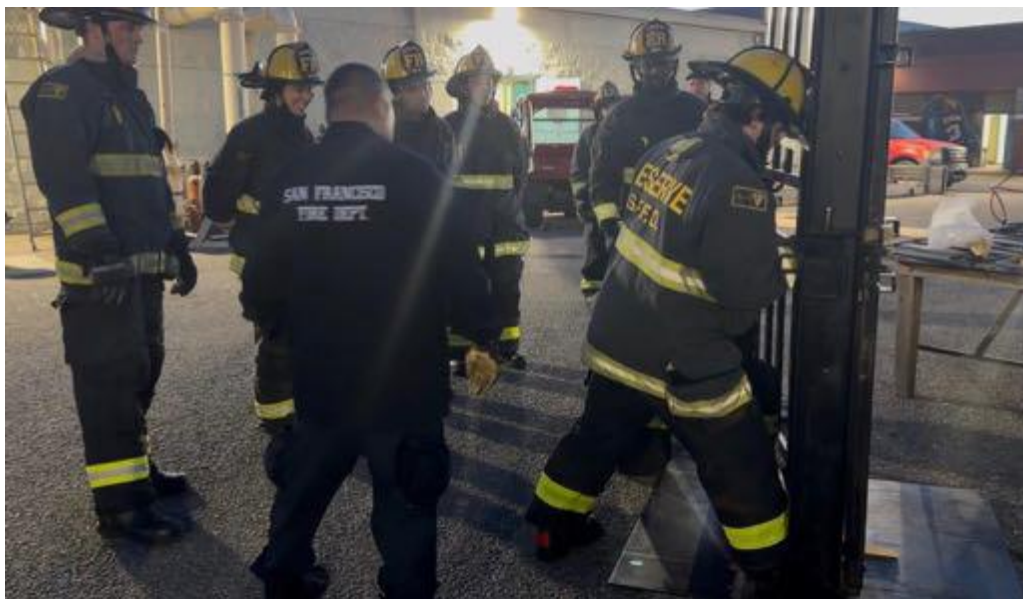

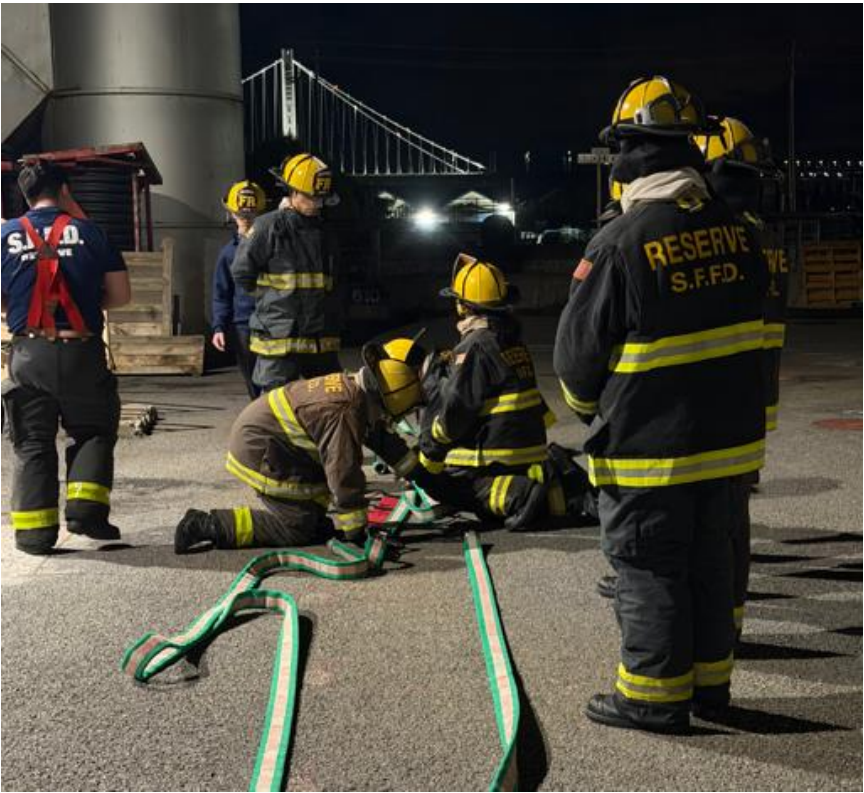
