- Coastal Rescue companies continue to give Surf Hazard education to the community while on calls, or while out in public.
- Cliff Rescue units provide cliff rescue and animal safety community outreach in areas such as Fort Funston, Ocean Beach, and Lands End.

- Earthquake safety tips such as DROP COVER HOLD ON promoted on social media sites this month.
- 05-04-2017 The Department PIO Spoke at the National Weather Service (NWS) Conference in Monterey on topics related to Ocean and Bay safety. The NWS now has a dedicated 24-hour hotline for public safety agencies to use to assist with mapping tidal flows and currents as they relate to a rescue. (An example would be putting a 100 lbs. person in the ocean and being able to chart where that person would be in 10 minutes due to the tides).
- 05-02-2017 Recruitment members attended the CAL-JAC Recruitment workshop in Sacramento, which emphasized efforts to reach underserved/underrepresented populations. (We are HIRING and we want YOU!)
- 05-02-2017 Spring Fire Safety tips given out weekly, such as home maintenance, dryer cleaning, weed abatement, and more.
- 05-04-2017 Members participated in the CCSF College Job Fair recruiting our youth and promoting our profession.
- This month the SFFD purchased a 10' by 4' Banner to be displayed at FS34 during HIGH SURF ADVISORY days. The Banner says: "DANGER, a HIGH SURF WARNING HAS BEEN ISSUED FOR TODAY" it also has a picture showing how to get out of a rip current.
- 05-07-2017 Members participated in the "Forest Knolls Safety Sunday" block party.

- 05-20-2017 to 05-21-2017 During the Bay to Breakers weekend it was warm out. The SFFD worked with the National Weather Service issuing graphics illustrating hydrations needs, PET safety in cars and out of the heat, and sun screen.
- 05-21-2017 SFD promoted sober driver options with all the events, and Warriors games in the City.

NOTABLE INCIDENTS

- 05-06-2017 WORKING FIRE 1st alarm 2167 Quesada Kitchen Fire SFFD extinguished quickly. This fire resulted in an adult being treated for Smoke Inhalation issues. He is expected to be okay. (Released from Hospital)
- 05-09-2017 CLIFF RESCUE Fort Funston 2 adults trapped 50 feet down cliff after hiking too far and sliding to a ledge. They were rescued with no injuries.
- 05-11-2017 BAY RESCUE Pier 33, an adult was rescued with no injuries after entering the water without proper gear and abilities.
- 05-11-2017 BAY RESCUE piers 7 an adult swimmer was in distress and rescued with minor injuries. She is expected to be okay. (Released)
- 05-11-2017 BAY RESCUE 1 Yacht Road an adult male was rescued after entering the water without proper gear or abilities. He is expected to be okay. (Released)
- 05-17-2017 WORKING FIRE 1st alarm 1206 Fell; extinguished quickly resulting in one adult being assisted out of the fire with minor burns. He is expected to recover. (Released)
- 05-20-2017 SURF RESCUE Lands End 2 adult swimmers who got caught in the currents rescued by the SFFD and USCG. They will be okay. The two avid swimmers did not expect the currents to be as strong, and got swept out into the mouth of the bay.
- 05-20-2017 A SHELTER IN PLACE order was given for a live wire down on an occupied MUNI-BUS at 18th and Noe. SFFD worked with SFPD and SFMTA mitigating this incident safely. No injuries occurred as a result of this incident.
- 05-20-2017 MOTOR HOME FIRE Jennings and Carrol Ave resulted in no injuries and 2 adults displaced. Red Cross provided services.
- 05-22-2017 HAZMAT Embarcadero #2 resulted in no injuries. This was a late night/early morning event. The result was an overheated motor.
- 05-23-2017 WORKING FIRE 1st alarm 34 Brighton Ave Single family dwelling and adult and child were taken to the hospital for evaluation, and are expected to be okay. This fire resulted in displacing 6 people.
- 05-27-2017 HIGHRISE FIRE 1st alarm 501 Beale resulted in no injuries or displacement. Multiple occupants were evacuated which went smoothly. SFFD worked with building management and SFPD to ensure the safety of all evacuated. The SFFD PIO worked with media partners increasing the flow of information related to this incident to those affected.

All Hazards Prevention and Education

- Members volunteered to teach First-Aid and Disaster preparedness every Wednesday this month at the John O'Connell High School Health Academy, engaging with our youth and giving them options to make career choices.
- FS 18 participated in multiple Park and Rec functions for youth this month on weekends. Encouraging our youth to be safe, and introducing them to possible career choices.
- 05-16-2017 SFFD Fire Reserves volunteered their day with the SF-Unified School Districts Track and Field Special Olympics event.

- 05-19-2017 SFFD members participated in the 2017 EMS day for Kids at John O'Connell High School for the EMS week kick off. Private EMS providers such as AMR and King America, along with SFFD, Chief Joanne Hayes-White, and D.E.M. provided disaster recovery skills training, including multiple real life scenarios. The students were able to see apparatus used by all agencies, ask questions, and speak to recruiters for career options.
- 05-20-2017 Members volunteered and participated at the Potrero Hill Community Health fair taking Blood Pressures, recruiting, and promoting our Department.

Department Functions

- Surf Rescue re-certification and certification occurred this month increasing our abilities to respond to water related incidents.
- Wildland recertification and initial training started this Month enhancing our ability to respond to mutual aid incidents safely.
- 05-08-2017 PGE taught a wildland electrical hazards class to our members to help keep us safe during wildland fires and deployments.
- CHP air operations has been participating in drills and has responded to a few Cliff and Surf Rescues this month adding to our resources to help during these types of incidents.
- Two 2-day Battalion chief Academies were given this month giving our supervisors the tools needed to be successful and safe.
- Facebook held its first ever Disaster Response Summit with the SFFD PIO being a keynote speaker for the event. It resulted in many great ideas and conversations on how social media plays a role in disaster incidents and recovery.
- May 21 to 27 is National Emergency Medical Services Week, which brings together local communities and medical personnel to publicize safety and honor the dedication of those who provide the day-to-day lifesaving services of medicine's front line. It also marks the 51st anniversary of emergency medical services, before which there were no ambulances or paramedics and many people were seriously hurt or worse when being taken to a hospital.
- 05-25-2017 San Francisco presented awards to medics, educators, dispatchers, and hospitals for their outstanding work and dedication during the EMS Awards Ceremony.
- 05-25-2017 EMS Day on Civic Center Plaza included vehicle displays such as San Francisco's Mass Care and Multi-Casualty Units, California's Disaster Medical Services Unit, and a Disaster Evacuation Vehicle. Paramedics and EMTs were available to talk to people interested in careers in emergency medical services, and provided life-safety demonstrations including CPR to the public.
- 05-26-2017 Command staff alongside of other EMS managers and supervisors participated in a BBQ at station 49 commemorating the end of EMS week. This BBQ was hosted and sponsored by the San Francisco Fire Credit Union, and was available to all of our 911 providers in SF.
- 05-27-28-2017 Members including many volunteers from FS7 participated in a safety booth with DBI and Kidde Fire Safety at the 2017 Carnaval. This resulted in 100's of bilingual community members receiving fire safety tips, demonstrations, recruitment options, and learning about being safe in San Francisco.

- 05-04-17 – Units responded to a shooting at McAllister and Larkin Streets. Medic 62, Medic 87, RC1. Patient pronounced on scene.
- 05-07-17 – Units responded to a multi-car crash at 16th and Caledonia Streets. Four patients, all transported to SFGH. Medic 70, 75, 86, and AMR18, and RC3.
- 05-14-17 – Units responded to a vehicle rollover at Van Ness and Ellis Streets. Medic 61, RC1. One patient transported to SFGH.
- 05-27-17 – Units responded to Sutro Baths (Jogging Trail). Cardiac Arrest victim. Medic 50, Medic 61, Engine 34. Bystander (civilian) CPR. Transported to Saint Mary’s (and subsequently transferred to SFGH).

ChemPack Drill

- Participated in ChemPack Drill with Department of Public Health
 - May 8, 2017
- Involved moving a ChemPack from a DPH pharmacy to a scene, removing the required supplies, and returning the residual to the pharmacy
 - EMS-1, EMS-2, RC-1, RC-3, Medic 58 participated in the drill

- Representatives from SFDPH and CA State DPH & OES were present
- Drill was very successful

New County Protocol for EMTS

- EMSA has included two medication administrations to the BLS Scope of Practice
 - EpiPen & Narcan
- These medications will enable our BLS crews to render life-saving treatment to patients prior to the arrival of an ALS resource
 - Used only on extremis patients
 - Epinephrine, also known as Adrenaline, opens the airways and is used to treat severe allergic reactions
 - Narcan, also called Naloxone, can reverse the effects of a narcotic overdose, and treat a patient who is not breathing due to a narcotic overdose
- Narcan will be administered via mucosal (nasal) atomizer
 - A device is connected to the Narcan syringe and sprays the medication into the patient's nostrils. The nasal mucosa absorbs the medication rapidly, and without harm to the patient
- Epinephrine comes packaged in a single use, spring-loaded device
 - Two concentrations; EpiPen for adults, and Epi Jr for pediatrics (half the adult dose)
- These medications will be distributed to every BLS company in the Department
 - All Trucks
 - All BLS Engines
 - Rescue 1 and Rescue 2
 - Fireboat

Fleet & Apparatus

- Continue to work with Central Shops to keep fleet in running order
- Considering different strategies
 - Different design for new vehicles
 - Improved communication between Station 49 and Central Shops through HRMS
- Manufacturer (Leader) will also effect repairs on certain vehicles

Hiring

- Conducted interviews for new H-8 Per Diem employees
 - Paramedic (ALS) personnel
 - May 30 and May 31
 - 36 invitations for interviews were sent out
- Working with Division of Training on Bump-Up Academy and H-3-Level I testing
- Also working on new evaluation and tracking program for probationary Level I and Level II members

Internal Policy Changes

- We experienced a failure of a sharps container
 - A needle poked through the sidewall
- We are working towards removing all of the same-design sharps container from all of our units (Engines and ambulances) and replacing them with in-vehicle containers
- We are also changing the mini-sharps container that is currently in the Jump Kits

EMS Week

- EMS Week was May 19 through May 26
- EMS crews participated in Health Sciences program at John O'Connell High School
- EMS Awards were given at the Koret Auditorium on May 25
 - Irene Ybara was awarded the Ray Lim Lifetime Achievement Award
 - Dan Nazzaretta was awarded Paramedic of the Year Award
 - Deputy Chief Gonzales and ADC Zanoft were presenters at the event
- On Friday, May 26, the Fire Credit Union sponsored a BBQ lunch at Station 49
- City Hall was lit in EMS colors on Friday, May 26. PIO Baxter and several members of our department, DEM, King/American, AMR, and CalOES were present for pictures

Narcotics Security/Safety on ALS Engines

- We are developing new packaging and protection systems for ALS Engine narcotics
 - Engines will receive numbered pelican cases for their narcotics, and will be sealed with tamper-proof tags
 - Engines will contact RCs for restock following narcotics administration, and the RC will reseal the pelican case
 - This system will add to the security of the medications, as well as rotate stock more efficiently

 - 105 unique individuals
 - Of these 105 high-frequency callers:

 - 15 of the top 20 callers were seen by EMS6
 - 35 of the top 100 callers were seen by EMS
- EMS6 had 228 encounters
 - 7.35 encounters per day
 - There were 61 unique individuals that comprised these 228 encounters

 - In the 27 watches for which we had notes (4 of the days of the month were worked by our relief crews, and they did not make any notes about individuals they did not respond to) we had 108 non-responses
 - This is, on average, 4 non-responses per day

Accelerated Code Enforcement in May

- Administrative Hearings:
 - Code Enforcement has held (13) hearings on 108 different properties. The majority have been resolved either with Orders of Rescission or Orders to Abate. Inspector Law is doing an excellent job of following up with each property owner to ensure they understand their obligations to comply with the NOV instructions.
 - The hearings are now regularly scheduled every two weeks and have been moved to every other THURSDAY (instead of Tuesdays). This has enabled our staff to have more days at the beginning of the week to conduct follow-up inspections to determine compliance and to finalize the agenda as necessary.
 - The next Administrative Hearing is scheduled for Thursday, June 15, 2017. There are (13) properties on the agenda and (1) continued from previous hearings.
