OPERATIONS REPORT

February 1, 2016 - February 29, 2016

GREATER ALARMS:

There was one greater alarm fire during this reporting period at the following location:

• **3rd Alarm** – 1567 Fulton Street – between Baker/Lyon (02/13/16) 2014 hours, 4-story, type 5, multi-residential (4 units). There was one injury to a civilian. Red Cross was called for 18 adults and 2 children who needed assistance. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. (AC Robert Postel)

PIO UPDATE

Community Outreach:

- Coastal Community outreach at Ocean Beach for HIGH SURF HAZARD safety tips (Engine 34 and Engine 18)
- February 6, Station 5 hosted fire prevention and education to children at a birthday party group.
- Joint Ocean Safety media event at Ocean Beach on February 12, 2016. NPS, USCG, SFFD, SFACC, 311. During this event we pushed out the message: "See Something, Say Something." There have been two rescues since this PSA that were successful due to the early onset of 911 calls from citizens who saw something, did not know if it was an emergency, but still said something. One of these rescues required a USCG helicopter. Furthermore, talking with locals from the beach this week, they see more awareness and precautions being taken by beachgoers. This was a SUCCESS.
- Social Media and SFFD off-duty assistance with "Firefighter Boot Camp", a CCSF college program to show people interested in firefighting what physical conditioning you should do.
- Increased effort to meet with and establish operational guidelines with members of the media for PIO contact.
- Increased effort to engage the media with community events, rather than only incidents.

Unified Operations:

During the third alarm fire, DEC received less calls from the media than they can
ever recall. All those calls were being directed to the SFFD PIO. The SFFD PIO
was giving updates every 5 minutes on social media, which the public and media
used.

SFFD worked with the multiple agencies this month during incidents to provide a joint and consistent message for both agencies. The following are some highlights from incidents last month:

SFFD responded during the night to a reported fire at a SFUSD public school. The media was calling SFFD for updates and among other questions, were asking if the school would be closed. The SFFD contacted the on-call SFUSD PIO and developed a joint message to be delivered to the media and determined who would deliver it. It included a message that the school would be open the following day.

SFFD responded to multiple calls involving trees down. The SFFD coordinated with Public Works on a joint message for reporting tree's down and how to get updates on the removal process. Calls from the media were also deflected to the Public Works PIO. Additionally, the SFFD responded to a traumatic event at a Public Works job site. The media was already present and asking for a statement. The SFFD worked with the Public Works PIO over the phone and delivered a joint message to the media regarding the incident.

SFFD responded to multiple calls with the SFPD this past month. One event of interest was the CHP officer involved stabbing. The CHP PIO was the partner of the injured officer and was not available. The SFFD and SFPD PIO's coordinated a joint message for the CHP and CCSF. This message was then delivered at a press event. This allowed the CHP command staff to focus on the officer and incident. Additionally, the SFFD and SFPD provided grief counselors for all public safety members involved.

A gas leak near SFGH resulted in the evacuation of a few homes and a clinic building. The media was calling the SFFD for information. The SFFD coordinated with PGE, San Francisco Sheriff's Office, San Francisco General Hospital and the SFPD to deliver social media public safety announcements as well as a joint and consistent message for the media regarding this event.

It is important to know that in all of these incidents, all inquiries regarding an event were directed to the responsible agencies' PIO.

— The SFFD's social media presence has doubled since last month. This is important because the more followers we have, the more information goes out to our community, including emergency messages. — The first meeting for a SFFD Social Media Policy, comprised of SFFD staff and a representative from Local 798, was held last month. The next meeting is scheduled for this week. The group has been eventful and is moving forward.

Prevention and Education:

- Safety tips provided on social media for Chinese New Year.
- Pedestrian, bicycle and motorist safety tip given throughout month on social media: "However you are traveling, bike, foot or car, be respectful of and aware of each other. A second of safety goes far.
- Safety tips provided on social media for wires down during windy days.
- Individual fire stations have been handing out fire prevention and education material to the community.
- Smoke detector awareness given on social media
- Product recalls that pose a fire hazard placed on social media.

Inter-Department Outreach:

- During daily drills, members of Station 48 and Station 40, on several occasions throughout the month, educated the public on why they are doing drills. This was done during drills.
- This message was given out on social media during a drill: "Training saves lives and enhances our skills. B1, E41, E13, and T13 daily drill at Icehouse Alley. Great job!"

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES:

- SFFD Ambulances responded 7006 times; transported 5203 for 71% market share.
- Collecting certificates for L1 to L2 bump-ups and will have complete list by March 9, 2016, currently have paperwork for 47 members.
- RC training for members on list and appointed members set for March 14, 2016
- Controlled Substance Policy in review phase.
- Continued meetings with EMS provider group, moving toward an EMS schedule that will allow better opportunity to meet EOA requirements

BFP/BFI:

Plan Check Section for February, 2016:

Permit totals are listed for your reference:

- Approximately 1007 permit applications were approved
- The above reviews generated Fire Plan Review fees of \$453,708.81 and Fire Inspection fees of \$140,869.98.
- February pre-apps: 60 total held with Building and Planning Departments; and including "Fire Only" pre-apps.
- There are 405 permit applications in our report for FIRE, however, 320 have already been reviewed and are on-hold awaiting responses from the applicants. This leaves 85 permit applications waiting to be reviewed.
- In February 2016, we collected \$35,800 in Water Flow revenue.

One Stop Permit Processing - All City Agencies at One Location:

Catherine Omalev, Controller's Office, spent February 25, 2016 at Permits observing the permit processing activities at the Front Counter. She was able to observe how difficult it is to simplify the permit process. She agreed that only permit applications for approved existing occupancies, involving a simple ownership change, should be processed via mail. She observed that many of the permit applications required face to face interaction with the permit applicants before it can be processed.

Miscellaneous:

— 24 smoke detectors were donated to the Chinese Progressive Association's SRO Coordinator Training on February 27, 2016.

TASC (Transportation Advisory Staff Committee) Update February, 2016:

- SFFD access issues with SFMTA 2nd Street Streetscape project 95% satisfied; project to be heard at TASC later this month.
- SFMTA proposing closure of Stockton St. to private vehicles from Geary to Market with clear travel lane reduction to a single lane for Muni use only and expansion of sidewalks in response to "local merchant" requests.
- Vallejo St. Piazza Saint Francis Plaza permanent street closure to vehicles heard at TASC with no objections; emergency vehicle access through plaza required to be maintained at all times.

Community Developments:

- <u>Hunter's Point Phase 2</u>; reactivated issues with wired Muni line orientation and aerial access a SFFD concern and need to be resolved.
- <u>Park Merced</u> SFFD fire vehicle access issues and street widths resolved; SFFD approved vehicle turn access; infrastructure awaiting acceptance from City agencies.
- Treasure Island/Yerba Buena Island 95% infrastructure plans under review by SFFD; YBI plans for demolition of 29 buildings approved.
- <u>Visitacion Valley/Schlage Lock</u> 95% infrastructure plan review comments being generated by SFFD
- <u>PotreroHOPE</u> project will have 26-foot wide streets; however, slopes exceed aerial ladder apparatus operating limits and DPW slope limits; sponsors to request variances from SFFD.
- SunnydateHOPE preliminary project meeting held to address slopes, street widths, and fire operation needs/building access including to interior courtyards; 36 blocks under SFFD review
- <u>Candlestick Point SubPhase CP-02, 03, 04</u> 95% infrastructure improvement plans, low pressure water design report under review.

High Rise/R2 Inspections/Accelerated Code Enforcement, February:

High-Rise:

- As of February 29, 2016, High Rise has completed 381 High-Rise building inspections.
- There are 224 High-Rise inspections remaining to be done this fiscal year.
- February had 8 High-Rise inspections pending.
- In addition to scheduled High-Rise inspections, the group has completed 403 annual permits, 43 violations, 167 R2 complaints for a total of 994 inspections.

R2 Inspections:

— Progress is being made towards adequately addressing complaints created as a result of R2 (Suppression) inspections of apartments and condo buildings with 9-units or more. The number of open or pending inspections has been reduced from 525 on February 3rd to 196 as of March 2, 2016. This number includes 127 open and 69 pending inspections.

Accelerated Code Enforcement (ACE):

- Continue to work with the City Attorney's Office (CAO) to improve interdepartmental communications and to establish guidelines for Accelerated Code Enforcement. We are expecting guidelines for all City Departments to be codified in proposed legislation.
- On February 25, 2016, participated in a code enforcement Task Force inspection at a Single Family Home (SFH) located in the Battalion 9 District. FIRE issued a Notice of Violation (NOV) listing 3 fire code violations and is continuing to communicate with other departments and the CAO. Through this ACE case, we plan to standardize and refine our processes for future Accelerated Code Enforcements.
- The Fire Marshal's Office is working with Dept. of Building Inspection (DBI) and Housing Inspection Services (HIS) to establish an Administrative Hearing process for Fire Code Violations. Proposed ordinance changes will mandate issuance of NOVs for <u>all</u> Fire Code violations. The Fire Marshal's Office recommends NOVs <u>shall</u> be issued for all "priority violations" (Sprinkler, Fire Alarm and Egress) and NOVs <u>may</u> be issued for all "other violations".
