



- Coastal Rescue companies continue to give <u>surf hazard education</u> to the community while on calls, or while out in public (targeted to Ocean Beach Area).
- Cliff Rescue units provide cliff rescue and animal safety community outreach in areas such as Fort Funston.

- Recruitment efforts towards all populations continue.
- "See the Red Lights Pull to the Right" campaign regarding yielding to emergency vehicles and how to react when there is an emergency vehicle is receiving public attention.
- Bicycle safety messages are on social media and in public areas promoting safe riding habits, wearing helmets, following the traffic laws, and yielding to pedestrians and emergency vehicles. It is an effort to reduce bicycle related acceidents and injuries.
- Pedestrian safety and distracted driver safety messages on social media: "Look don't like" (referring to texting); yield to pedestrians; and share the road with bicyclists, to name a few.
- Pet safety tips for heat related issues placed on social media and shared with media outlets. Do not forget your pets when making a home or work escape or disaster plan.
- Cliff and hiking safety messaging on social media to help reduce falls, entrapments and rescue incidents.
- Information on the station rebuilds and ESER 2014 bonds have been posted on social media to help keep the community informed.
- The Department is part of a national fire service campaign called: "Close Your Door Before You Doze." This campaign encourages the closing of bedroom doors at night to increase your chances of survival or being rescued during a fire. The temperature outside a door can reach 1000 degrees, in comparison to 100 degrees behind a closed bedroom door.
- The Department has teamed up with DEM to promote the "When to Call 911" campaign to help reduce non-emergency calls to 911.



Field Incidents

- 04-03-19 Units responded to an industrial accident. A crane dropped several 10' beams and narrowly missed a construction worker. Patient was transported to SFGH. Medic 65, RC-1, Battalion 5.
- 04-07-19 Units responded to a reported surf rescue. Patient was pronounced dead on scene. Medic 64, RC-2, Battalion 7.
- 04-11-19 Units responded to reports of a man pinned under a vehicle. Patient transported to SFGH with chest injuries. Medic 75, RC-4, Battalion 10.
- 04-14-19 Units responded to reports of a man who fell thirty feet from the roof of a building. Transported to SFGH with CPR in progress. Medic 50, RC-3, Battalion 2.
- 04-24-19 Units responded to reports of a 1 month old baby in cardiac arrest. Patient was defibrillated once and regained consciousness. Transported to Mission Bay. Patient was awake and crying on arrival. Medic 83, RC-2.

Special commendation to the Stress Unit. EMS has called several times for their support, and they provided excellent service for members. EMS has noticed an increase in calls to the Stress Unit. Members are becoming more comfortable with speaking up regarding a bad call, or an incident that troubled them.
