




Summery of Results

- We detected multiple PFAS in everyone tested, with higher amounts in FF.
- Among Firefighters we found evidence that assignment/rig position may be associated with increased levels of PFASs
- firefighters who reported using firefighting foam had higher concentrations of PFOA






















Supporting our Community
