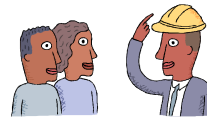

At the Core—Volunteer Committees

NERT is growing with every graduating class. That's the great news. The good news is that the NERT Advisory Board is taking steps to help the program grow with the numbers and continue its status as a model in citizen emergency response training. The mission of the Advisory Board is to ensure the continuity and growth of the NERT program and support NERT volunteers in team and leadership development. It's a big job and the Board, under the leadership of NERT Program Coordinator Lt. Erica Arteseros, has established three standing committees to come up with ideas and make recommendations to the Board. The committees are Coordinator Development, Media/Public Information/Events, and Training. These, the first three committees, were chosen because these areas have such an impact on the NERT program. There will be others in the future; these are our core.

The Coordinator Development Committee held its first meeting in February 2007, led by Chairperson, Edie Schaffer (Ingleside). Members Bob Bennett (South Beach), Eilish Cronin (Sunset/Parkside), Maxine Fasulis (Noe Valley), Jamie Lopez (Hayes Valley), Susan Yip (Balboa Terrace/Mt Davidson Manor), and Barbara Underberg (Bernal Heights) will review the way in which NERT recruits, trains, and supports neighborhood coordinators.



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The Media/Public Information/Events Committee - John D'Avolio (Haight), Jeff Gibbs (Treasure Island), Lynn Jacklevich (Potrero Hill), Jed Lane (Mt. Davidson/Miraloma), Ted Olsson - is also chaired by Edie Schaffer. The Media Committee has already developed NERT Public Relations Plan for 2007, which it is now busy implementing. But the Committee's most exciting success in 2006 was the post-drill coverage of the October Citywide NERT drill, on Channels 2 and 7. This year, the Media Committee will work to get advance publicity for the April Citywide Drill, as well as post-drill coverage. In addition, the Committee is reviewing ways that NERT might improve its ties to businesses and other disaster-related organizations in the Bay Area.

Home Safety—Seniors, NERT, SFFD

In 1960 few people had heard of smoke alarms and fewer could afford them. Twenty-five years later, 96% of US residences, of all types, are equipped with alarms—though tragically, almost 20% of them are not working for want of a battery—dead or removed because it was a nuisance! How often do we hear, after a death in a fire, that the home had no smoke alarm!



The San Francisco Fire Department Prevention Division, in collaboration with the Department of Public Health and the Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation, is offering **FREE** smoke alarms with **FREE** installation and a **FREE** home safety survey! Volunteers will install new smoke alarms or replace old ones—it just takes a phone call. Why does the SFFD need NERT's help? There are a



lot of seniors who have not heard about the program or are reluctant to let strangers into their homes or have language difficulties. We can help because we are neighbors—people known and trusted. Tell your older neighbors about the program, talk to their caregivers and family. NERT volunteers are also needed to assist with installation. Two upcoming training/installation dates are Saturday, June 2, 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. and Saturday, June 23, 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. We can make a difference **now** for San Francisco seniors.

Benefits of Knowing Your Neighbors!

SAFE—Safety Awareness for Everyone—can help you organize and start a Neighborhood Watch Group

Neighbors who know each other are more likely to look out for each other, more likely to notice and report suspicious activities, and more likely to help each other during emergencies. Get involved – you can start a Neighborhood Watch group or get your neighbors to NERT training or create a NERT Block! Here are 5 ways to start.



1. **Start a SAFE Neighborhood Watch Group** – SAFE's Neighborhood Watch groups are organized to problem-solve, prevent crime and address public safety issues. They are the essence of community policing because neighbors are empowered to increase communication with the police, and learn about effective ways to prevent crime in their neighborhood.
2. **Organize a Block Party or BBQ** - what a great way to get to know your neighbors! Once you know the people on your block, social gatherings can be a great way to talk about improving your community together.
3. **Develop an Emergency Preparedness Plan & Attend NERT Training** – You and your neighbors can be prepared and ready to help each other when a disaster or local emergency occurs.
4. **Problem solve together on crime and quality of life issues** - SAFE Neighborhood Watch groups are more likely to be effective in preventing and responding to criminal activities and improving the quality of life on their block when they get organized! Groups can also organize a day of painting out graffiti or picking up litter in their community. Don't forget to include schools, merchants and public/subsidized housing in your problem-solving and neighborhood organizing efforts!
5. **Participate in local community & police events** - when you get to know your district station police officers, you can help organizations like SAFE further its community policing initiatives by participating in neighborhood events and activities, which bring residents, merchants and the police together.

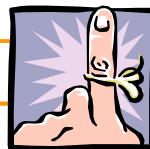

Neighbors looking out for neighbors—SAFE and NERT share a goal.

1. Talk to your neighbors about earthquake preparedness and NERT— Do you want or need them to be part of your emergency plan? Talk about your plans, how they can help, and how they can become safer and more prepared themselves. Tell them about the new NERT Personal Preparedness Workshop (see page 5) and the Senior Safety Program (see page 1).

2. Make your block party or BBQ an "emergency food cook off" or "how to feed your family without a kitchen!"

3. Start a NERT Block team—persist in getting your neighbors to NERT training. Drop

off class schedules, invite them to attend a drill with you, give them tips and checklists. What better way to know that the people next to and across from you, can help **you** in an emergency!

4. As others get trained, prepared or just interested, work on a Block Emergency Plan. Who knows your families, homes, and needs better—and who might be there to help you? Consider where people can safely assemble or how to evacuate your block or who will need the most help or!

What's Up in the Airways by KF6PFV

Date line Washing ton D.C: Morse Code requirement for US amateur radio, HAM operators, dropped effective Friday February 23, 2007. Old timers scratching their heads in disbelief!

On February 23, 2007 the requirement for US amateur radio operators to pass a Morse code exam was discontinued.. This move by the FCC has been in the works for a long time. Those "in the know" have been predicting the change since the U.S. Coast Guard announced that they would no longer monitor code several years ago. Many European countries had dropped the code requirement a few years before the Coast Guard made its announcement.

The FCC changes cover not only the code requirement but also the US Band Plan authorization and eliminate the Novice Class. Novice Class and Technician Class, both entry level Hams, have been combined into one group maintaining the Technician Class name, with extended privileges not available to the Techs previously. Dropping the code requirement means it will be easier for Ham operators to get their General and Extra licenses. Other changes, and more details, can be found on the ARRL web site (arrl.org).

How do these changes affect NERT HCT Communicators and NERT staging area communications? Simply put, not at all! NERT will continue to work on the 2 meter band, sending and receiving messages as we are trained to do. ☐

You can contact NERT hams through Bob Jacklevich, 415-282-4195 or KF6PFV on local repeaters. NERT Ham Communications Team (HCT) can listen and learn from the Auxiliary Communications Service. ACS holds two 'nets' weekly.

"Siren Net", every Tuesday at noon, is your chance to call in and report on the operation of sirens located throughout the City. Call in on the W6TP repeater: 443.100+ pl 114.8 or 146.79-pl 114.8.

"ACS Net" for ACS members is Thursdays at 7:30 p.m. on WA6GG repeater, 442.050+ pl 127.3. All are welcome! ACS Operations phone 415-558-2717.

San Francisco's geography makes it necessary to use different repeaters. Hams on the north and west sides of the City should use 145.150; on the east and south sides, use 146.79- or 443.100 pl 114.8. Red Cross Mass Care Shelter simplex frequency is 147.420; monitor 145.15+ and 146.79-.

The San Francisco Amateur Radio Club is another resource for Hams. Call 415-563-2111 or check the web site, www.sfarc.org or phone 415-245-1114. The SFARC radio net is Mondays at 8 p.m. on the W6PW repeater, 145.150-pl 114.8.

Program your radio so frequencies 01 through 13 are the SFFD Emergency Response District (ERD) stations. The frequencies are on page 7.
